# FREE EMPLOYMENT BUREAU.

Opening An Agency.

Harrisburg (Special) .--- Chief ' of the Bureau of Industrial Statistics advisability of establishing free employment agencies in the larger cities of the State. The idea is to furnish employment gratuitously to persons seeking work after the plan in force in Illinois where. during 1906, 53,637 persons obtained employment through the free agencies in Chicago and other large cities of that state.

"The justice of such a plan," said in connection with private employtics that the cost to the individual furnished employment was nothing and to the State less than sixty cents.

An experimental agency will be established by Mr. Rockey in one of the cities of Pennsylvania and if it be a success the next Legislature will be asked for an appropriation to continue the plan




