## THE EXHIBITS.

The Variety and Quality of Exhibits from the Farm, Orchard, Vineyard and Garden Exceptionally Large and Fine.

All through the summer it was thought that of necessity the exhibit at the Grange Encampment and Fair to be drawn from the farm, orchard, vineyard and garden would be small on account of the supposed scarcity of the products from the various departments of the farmers acres, but with this apparent fact staring the management in the face, Hon.
