TO RAISE CHINESE LILIES. Before the Chinese lily bulb has a chance to sprout put it on the shelf of a dark closet, otherwise it will flourish and grow voluminously but still never blossom. When it has been hidden in the dark closet for several days and the sprouts are well under way it may be placed in its usual shallow dish with water and pebbles.-New York World.

THE CHOPPING-BASIN.

A labor-saving device is called the chopping-basin. It consists of a wooden bowl fitted with a circular chopper, which may be used for preparing left-over cold meats for hashes and stews. For croquettes and force, meat balls a small grinder or mill is manufactured which is a most use ful and economical addition to the kitchen shelf.-New York World

TO CLEAN SKIRTS.

Hang the skirts on the line; give them a good beating, then whisk them off with a clean brush dampened in ammonia and warm water. If there are any spots, rub with a sponge or black cloth (if the skirt is black) dipped in equal parts of alcohol, ammonia and water. After the skirt is thoroughly cleansed, brushed and dried, lay it on a skirt board and pin each plait down in its proper fold, cover the skirt with a piece of dark woolen goods which has been dampened, then press,-Boston Post.

MADRAS CURTAINS.

It will not be long before lace curtains will be only something to recall as a past fancy in household decorations, just as we remember the gold vases, enlarged pictures and picture throws. The lace curtains which will remain, if they do at all, will be fine, expensive and genuine luxuries. The reason for this is because madras and other materials of like kind are fast taking the place of the fragile, lacy drapery. Not wholly for window purpose, but portieres and the like are they used. Silks are used for the windows and some of the finest meshed nets and many exquisite striped materials which are like sheer dress fabrics. The tapestry effects in madras are beautiful and suit well the rich house furnishings. Some of the patterns are as rich in appearance as any of the oriental fabrics of rare materials and great value and not very expensive only in the finer grade of madras fabrics. Madras is of different grades, colors and widths, with prices ranged accordingly.-New Haven Register.

FINISHING TOWELS. The ends of the towels may be scalloped and worked with solid but-

tonhole stitch. There may be a design in eyelet and French embroidery above the scallop on one end and the scallop with the initials on the other

Letters from four to six inches high can be used on the towels. They should be padded.

First, take short running stitches, just inside the stamped outlines, fill the space between the running stitches with a layer of outline stitches set close and even; into this layer of outline stitches work another layer, taking the stitches of the second layer into the stitches of the first layer and not into the material. Work a third layer into the stitches of the second layer in the same man-

Work across this padding close satin stitch, setting the needle for the satin stitch on the stamped outlines of the letter; these outlines should never be covered with the padding stitches.-Now Haven Register.

RECIPES.

Sugar Cookies-Cream together one half pound butter and one pound sugar. Add two well-beaten eggs, one-half cup milk and one teaspoonful baking powder, sifted with three cups of flour. Roll rather thin and bake in a quick oven.

Scotch Pancakes-One pint milk, two teaspeonfuls butter, four eggs, two-thirds cupful flour, one teaspoonful baking powder and a pinch of salt; sift the flour, salt and baking powder together; add milk, eggs and butter, melted; mix into a thin batter. Have a small round frying pan with a little lard melted in it. Pour in one-half cupful of batter, turn pan round to cover it with the batter. place on hot fire to brown, then hold it up in front of fire, and the pancake will rise right up. Spread each pancake with jam and roll up.

Irish Stew-Cut into neat pieces three pounds of neck of mutton, trimming off all fat; peel and cut in slices about one pound of potatoes, slice four onions rather thickly; put a layer of potatoes at the bottom of a stewpan, then a layer of mutton and onions mixed, seasoning to taste with pepper and salt. Continue these until the pan is full. Pour over it all one pint of bot water, cover down the pan closely and cook it slowly but steadily for 21-2 hours, shaking the pan occasionally to prevent sticking to the bottom and burning, but do not take off cover until cooked.
