The Centre Reporter wishes to extend thanks to its many patrons for the kindly way in which appeals for subscriptions were received. With the exception of twenty-five or thirty, every subscriber to the Centre Reporter is either paid up within a year of this date, or else in advance of this date, the latter predominating largely. With the rarest exceptions, appeals were kindly received, and many remittances were accompanied with cheering words for the paper and its Editor, and very few readers ordered their paper discontinued.
