State S. S. Convention.  
A state Sunday School convention will be held at Shamokin October 14-16. Delegates from all parts of the great state of Pennsylvania will be present, representing more than 1,417,831 scholars and over 156,144 officers and teachers, as will also men and women of national and international fame.

Dedication Date for Memorial set.  
Governor Stuart approved of November 11 as the date upon which the memorial to Pennsylvania regiments at Fredericksburg shall be dedicated.

The memorial is to perpetuate the bravery of Humphrey's Division at the storming of Mary's Heights, Fredericksburg, on December 13, 1862, in which it lost one-fourth of its men. The regiments from this state engaged were the one hundred and twenty-third, one hundred and twenty-sixth, one hundred and twenty-ninth, one hundred and thirty-first, one hundred and thirty-third and one hundred and thirty-fourth, which have no memorials anywhere.

Keith's Theatre.

Woman Saves Man From Angry Bull.  
Harry C. Dennis, who is employed by Miss Lavina Smith, on the old Custer farm along the pike east of Lamar, Clinton county, was attacked by an angry bull at about 7 o'clock Saturday evening and badly injured. He was in the act of chaining the enraged beast when it knocked him down and commenced to trample the prostrate man. It is quite likely that it would have gored him to death had not Miss Smith come to his rescue with a pitchfork, which she used with good effect.

During this time Mr. Dennis managed to get out of the stall, but soon became unconscious. Dr. J. H. Huston, of Clintondale, was hurriedly summoned, but it was discovered that no bones were broken, yet he was very badly bruised. His escape from death was miraculous and Miss Smith's quick response to his cries and her activity in attacking the beast alone saved the injured man's life.

The Academy was formally opened February 22, 1866. From the best information obtainable the first teacher of the Academy was Miss Lizzie Kuhn, a daughter of Rev. Samuel Kuhn, of Aaronburg. Miss Kuhn afterward married L. O. Foss, and is now deceased.

In the spring of 1867, D. M. Wolf, now Rev. D. M. Wolf, D. D., became the institution. Other heads of the institution were: Howard Gutellu, Joel T. Rositer, now Rev. Rositer, D. D., of Baltimore, Md.; A. E. Truxall, now Rev. Truxall, D. D., of Meyerdsale; William C. Schaeffer, now Rev. Schaeffer, L. L. D., of Lancaster; Rev. J. B. Kerschner, D. D., of Freeland; G. W. Kerschner, of New York; Harry Keller, of Boalsburg; George D. Gurley, of Lancaster; Prof. G. W. Hosterman.

Prof. Hosterman was the last head of the Penn Hall Academy. At that time a Grammar school was opened at Spring Mills in the Grenoble building. Dr. Wolf taught at Spring Mills in 1881, and was succeeded by Prof. H. F. Bitner, now of Millersville Normal. Other teachers who followed were A. S. Brendle, now an attorney in Lebanon; Lewis Reiter, now a minister at Harmony.

In 1882 the new school building at Spring Mills was opened, and has since accommodated what is known as the Academy. The Academy was conducted during the spring and autumn as private schools, and this arrangement is still continued. C. M. Smith was the first teacher in the new building. He was followed by: C. R. Neff, Centre Hall; and Prof. W. P. Hosterman.

Dr. Wolf again returned as principal, closing in 1903, when Prof. Hosterman resumed work there and is the present head. He is a strong and forceful teacher, and as an instructor has few superiors.

The foregoing are a few bare facts gathered from the pages of the Penn Hall-Spring Mills Academy History, written by the historical committee—J. Frank Meyer, S. Ward Gramley, John D. Meyer, C. W. Fisher, Mrs. W. H. Kreamer—appointed by the chairman of the reunion committee.

H. C. Roberts, of Yeagertown, accompanied by his twelve-year-old daughter, Miss Gussie, of Watertown, Tennessee, were in Centre Hall Saturday, the guests of Dr. J. R. G. Allison. Mr. Roberts had not seen his daughter for nine years, and as she will be with him for a month, he is calling that period a thirty days' love feast.
