FATHER AND SON

Benjamin De Gildo, Having Shot Down Enemies, Tries to Escape - Being **Closely Pursued He Turns Weapon** Upon Himself and Dies Instantly Patrick Murphy, Struck by Bullet.

Westchester, Pa. (Spec'al) .- Benfamin DeGildo, of Philadelphia, shot and killed Benjamin DeFelix, fatally wounded Pasquale DeFelix, father of the murdered man, here and then, to escape capture at the hands of an infuriated mob, committed suicide by shooting himself.

The sensational shooting is said to be the outgrowth of a feud that has existed between the Italians for a long time. The bad feeling was recently increased by the arrest of DeFelix, the murdered man, on a charge of keeping a "speakeasy" and being identified with a counterfeiting high explosive. When the nose of plot. DeFelix was cleared of the charges at a hearing in Philadelphia. at which time he openly accused DeGildo of having offered to give Black Hand agents \$75 to kill De-Felix

DeGildo came here accompanied by Angella Diermernegildo. The couple met Benjamin DeFelix on the street. few words passed and DeGildo frew a revolver and shot DeFelix in the breast. As the man fell, DeGildo sent another bullet into his body. The shooting ocurred not far from the DeFelix home and Pasquale Do Felix, father of the murdered man ran to the assistance of his son. He felled DeGildo with a brick and as he struggled to his feet DeGildo again used his revolver, sending a bullet into the elder DeFelix's abdomen. DeGildo fled, pursued by an angry mob including many friends of the DeFelix family.

Unable to shake off his pursuers DeGildo stopped running and facing hold when the first 40 pounds of the mob turned his revolver upon explosion let go. His first tube himself, dying instantly. Miners And Tuberculasis,

A mining journal published at Scranton has been calling attention to the curious fact that in coal mining communities there is a marked deficiency in the mortality from tuberculosis as compared with that of other localities. This is a phenomenon that has also been observed in Great Britian and attention has been drawn to it by B. H. Thwaite. According to Mr. Thwaite, the effects noted may be due to the physiological effects of carbonmonoxide, for he finds that men engaged about, blast furnaces and gas producers are peculiarly free from tuberculous trouble.

It is suggested that the presence of carbon dust in the lungs may be a cause of production of CO, and that this will serve to explain the immunity of miners from the disease. The tubercle bacillus is a creature of extreme tenacity of life. It is encased in a waxy integument and is proof against even pliric acid, but gases are so penetrating in their powers of diffusion that it can well be considered that carbonic oxide might reach the tissues of a creature in a subtle manner, for the gas can-not be perceived .-- From Mines and Minerals.

Peat Alcohol.

In the manufacture of alcohol from peat a Danish company, with one experimental plant in Denmark and one in France, has found the cost to be about one-fourth of that made from potatoes. In the process of manufacture, the cellulose or fiber of the peat is converted by sulphuric acid into a soluble carbohydrate and this is fermented by a special yeast.






