State of Pennsylvania

STATE RECOVERS MONEY.

Treasurer Sheatz Is Paid 40 Per Cent Of Half Million.

Harrisburg (Special). - The State secured the first installment of the half million or so of public money which was on deposit in the Allegheny National Bank, when it closed, State Treasurer John O. Sheatz receiving checks representing 40 per cent of the sum. The payment was made by receiver Robert Lyons, of the bank, in the form of checks for \$185,982.18 for the general fund account and \$23,604.36 for the sinking fund.

"This is the first payment to be made," said Treasurer Sheatz, "and I hope we can get the rest soon. We shall look to the sureties for it in the event of the receiver being unable to pay it. As regards entering suit, that is a matter for the Attorney General's department."

Sheatz has been endeavoring to get the money ever since the bank closed two days after he assumed his office, and has made a number of trips to Pittsburg, in which he passed upon several plans. The time has now come, in his opinion, for the State to get the money due it with interest.

The treasurer met representatives of the surety companies which were on the bonds of the closed Cosmopolitan National Bank of Pittsburg, at which it was arranged that the State's \$100,000 deposit should be paid before the end of the week.

BODY FOUND IN RIVER.

Victim Had Been Shot In Back Of Head.

Lancaster (Special). - Washington borough and the entire lower end of Lancaster County is greatly exercised over the finding in the Susquehanna River, near the Maryland line, of the body of a well-dressed man, who had evidently been murdered. The man was probably 40 years of age and was refined in appearance.

There was a gaping bullet wound in the back of his head and, secured to the feet with heavy strands of wire, were a number of metal fish-plates. Some money was found on the body, but no papers or clothing marks that might lead to possible identification.

Pennsylvania Railroad officers have taken the body in charge and will endeavor to fathom the mystery of the man's death.

MEMORIAL SITE SELECTED.

State Monument At Gettysburg To Be Near "Bloody Angle."

Harrisburg (Special). - The State Gettysburg Battlefield Memorial Commission has selected a knoll beside Hancock Avenue, on the scene of the third day's battle, as the site for the proposed state memorial, which will be erected at a cost of \$125,000.

This site, together with a design of the proposed double arch, will be forwarded to the Gettysburg Battlefield Commission and later to the Secretary of War for approval. The location is close to the "Bloody Angle" and opposite the Meade statue. The successful sculptor, Samuel A. Murray, of Philadelphia, will soon begin work.

FREIGHT TRAFFIC HEAVY.

Movement On The Pennsylvania The Highest Since December 28.

Harrisburg (Special). - The Philadelphia division of the Pennsylvania Railroad, extending from this city to Philadelphia, Wednesday handled the largest number of cars for any day since December 28. There were 6,836 handled, while the movement on the middle division, between this city and Altoona, was 6,567, close to a record.

The Pennsylvania has ordered stored cars along the middle division to be repaired for service at once. Over 300 went into the shops in this city and vicinity alone. The cars are needed for increasing freight traffic.

CROSSES CONTINENT TO WED.

Reading Girl Will Be Married On The Pacific Coast.

Reading (Special). - Miss Olive Babb, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. John Babb, of this city, left on a trip of 3,000 miles to Los Angeles, Cal., to become the bride of Marvin E. Beck, formerly of this city, who is now engaged in business there.

Miss Babb took with her a handsome wedding gown and several trunks full of presents sent by friends.

Big Steeln Works Getting Busy.

Harrisburg (Special). - The Pennsylvania Steel Company has started some additional open hearth steel furnaces. Hours have also been increased in some departments and a distinctly better tone is noted at the Steelton works. Local mills report increases of orders, the Central Iron & Steel Company having taken a number of orders for plates for hulls of new warships.

Octogenarian Victim Of Robbers.

Clarion (Special). - Two disguised men bound, gagged and robbed John Knight, an octogenarian, at Knox, and then stole a horse and buggy and made their escape. They are supposed to be the same pair who shot and robbed a hotel keeper at Fryburg, and for the arrest of whom the County Commissioners have offered a reward of \$500.

Robbed Of Savings Of Years.

Selinsgrove (Special). - Held up and beaten unconscious by two strangers along the Reading Road tracks five miles above here, John Yurn, of Shenandoah, was robbed of over \$500, the savings of four years' labor.

COMMERCIAL COLUMN

Weekly Review of Trade and Latest Market Reports.

Bradstreet's says: Retail trade still reflects the influence of warm weather and the approach of election breeds conservatism as regards heavy buying and the projection of new enterprises.

However, there is more doing and more confident buying of raw material by manufacturers, who apparently forecast a change for the better in the latter part of this year or the early part of next. The large movement of wheat to market is responsible for the optimistic tenor of reports from distributive centers in the Northwest. Effects of the drought are shown in almost total suspension of steamboat traffic on the Ohio River and its tributaries, the holding up of large quantities of coal along that stream, the prevalence of destructive fires, the low stage of water supplies. Reports as to collections vary, being best in the Northwest and poorest at the South.

The situation in textile lines is interesting, and not without encouragement. While jobbing trade is confined largely to immediate shipment or filling-in orders, there is fair activity in the Chicago district and farther West, where the breaking of the drought has helped sentiment. In the cotton goods line one feature early was a reduction in shirting prints, but later an enlarged demand was reported for print cloths at Fall River, and prices advanced 1/4 to 1/2 cent. Confidence buying by a large printing interest in the reported basis for the strength in demand and prices.
