NEWS OF PENNSYLVANIA

FEVER EPIDEMIC ENDANGERS CATTLE

Dreaded Mouth and Foot Disease Prevalent in Mo-tour.

Danville (Special).—A serious outbreak of a contagious foot and mouth disease of cattle has occurred in Montour and Northumberland Counties. The outbreak is considered of so serious a nature that there arrived in Danville several representatives of the State Livestock Sanitary Board, and three experts of the United States Department of Agriculture, who are now occupied in an effort to prevent the spread of the malady.

The foot and mouth disease is common in Europe, but exceedingly rare in this country. This is the first time the disease has ever broken out in Pennsylvania and only the second time in North America, it having been epidemic in New England in 1892, when thousands of cattle died.

The outbreak here has been traced to a car load of cattle shipped to Danville from Buffalo, New York, and sold to different farmers in this vicinity by a local dealer.

Already the State authorities have placed four farms and a cattle pen under strict quarantine. All the cattle on these places are dying.

MADE NICKELS AND DIMES.
Clever Counterfeiter Floods Luzerne County With Change.

Hazleton (Special).—Wassil Kalma, an intelligent foreigner, was arrested here as a counterfeiter, it being charged that for many months he had been engaged in flooding the region, and particularly the farming districts, with spurious dimes and nickels.

Kalma recently became so bold that he frequently paid his bills with the spurious coin, and that he escaped detection so long was due to his thriftiness, he working in the mines by day and at counterfeiting by night.

The discovery of the counterfeiting was made through John Daubert, a boy residing at Black Ridge. He went home with a pocket full of nickels which he showed his father. The boy said they had been given to him by Kalma's son, and that the boy said his father had plenty of that kind of money.
The police were notified, and searched Kalma's house, but only a few of the nickels and dimes were found. The officers learned that Kalma had an intimation of their coming, and had thrown the entire counterfeiting outfit into a cesspool.

TARIFF ON HONEY WANTED.
Pennsylvania Beekeepers Ask For Protection.

York (Special).—A resolution urging that a tariff be placed on honey equal to or greater than the present schedule of 20 cents a gallon was unanimously adopted at the convention of the Pennsylvania State Beekeepers' Association. Another resolution that it is the desire of the beekeepers that a duty of 10 cents a pound be placed on beeswax was also adopted.

DRUMMERS CROWD HOTELS.
Lots Of Business, But No Accommodations In Altoona.

Altoona (Special).—Since the election a great army of drummers have taken to the roads. Local hotels have been swamped by demands for accommodations and are turning guests away.

The salesmen report a tremendous business here, the buying within the past week being 50 per cent. greater than at any week the last year in anticipation of increased demands for goods.

SUFFOCATED BY GASOLINE.
Girl With Head Wedged In Pail Meets Horrible Death.

Pittsburg (Special).—Overcome by the fumes of gasoline, which she was pouring from a tank into a pail, Merl Kansig, 17 years old, of Moon Run, Collier Township, fell into the pail of fluid. Her head was tightly wedged in the vessel, and she died of slow suffocation.

Arrested For 14-Year-Old Crime.
Wilkes-Barre (Special).—Anthony Maner, who returned to Pittston after an absence of 14 years was arrested within a few hours for the crime which caused him to flee from the city.

During a quarrel, he drew a revolver and fired three times at Alderman Thomas J. O'Brien. Each shot missed, however, and Maner fled. Thinking that the shooting had been forgotten, he returned. He admitted the shooting. Mayor Gillespie held him for a further hearing.

STEEL TRUST TO ENLARGE.

Will Spend \$5,500,000 For New Plants.
Pittsburg, (Special).—The United States Steel Corporation has decided upon new plans and extensions in the Pittsburg district to cost \$5,500,000, the greater part of which will be used to increase its capacity for pressed steel cars.

President William E. Corey left for the East, after a conference with superintendents of subsidiary plants covering two days, although usually such conferences are concluded in half a day. Just before leaving he announced that the Steel Corporation would immediately erect in the Pittsburg district a new pressed-steel car-wheel plant at a cost of \$3,000,000; that improvements and extensions of the Schoen Steel Wheel Company, recently acquired by the corporation, would be made at a cost of \$1,500,000, and that extensions of some of the departments of the Homewood Steel Company would be made at a cost of at least \$1,000,000.

The pressed-steel wheel industry, President Corey said, is rapidly coming to the front and promises to be an important factor in the business of the Steel Corporation for some time to come.

Sixty per cent. of the corporation's total equipment is now in operation, Mr. Corey said, and the outlook for 1909 is most promising. It is expected that a large portion of the idle equipment will shortly be put into operation, and the coming year is expected to be the most prosperous in the history of the big iron and steel organization.

Tries Hard To Die.
Oil City (Special).—After taking nine morphine pills, thirteen antiseptic tablets of corrosive sublimate, a tablespoon full of powdered glass, a teaspoonful of concentrated lye and slashing her throat with a razor in an attempt to commit suicide, Della Barrett, of this city, will live. Her vitality puzzles physicians.

Corey Home Without Wife.
Pittsburg (Special).—W. E. Corey, president of the United States Steel Corporation, arrived in Pittsburg from New York. He was met at the Union Station by two young men, who carried his grips to the baggage office. His actress bride, Mabel Gilman, did not accompany him.

STATE ITEMS.
Peter H. Strubinger, proprietor of the Hotel Hanover at Hanover and of Adams County's leading citizen, died at his home in Abbottstown.

The grand jury found a true bill of indictment charging former Judge R. E. Koch, with criminal libel, the prosecutor in the case, Hon. C. A. Snyder, just elected State Senator from Schuylkill, basing his charge on an article published in a Pottsville paper on the eve of the Republican primaries last April.
The contract to erect the Panther Creek Valley Hospital on a spot of ground by the Lehigh Coal & Navigation Company was awarded to J. Andrew Breslin, of Summit Hill. The structure will cost \$30,000. Work will be started at once.

When the Schuylkill & Lehigh passenger train from Reading pulled into Slattington it collided with the Lehigh Valley shifter. Two people were slightly injured.
Governor Stuart named the following delegates to represent the State at the annual session of the American Mining Congress at Pittsburg, December 2: H. H. Stook, Scranton; W. J. Richards, Pottsville; Morris Williams, Philadelphia; W. W. Jamison, Greensburg; John H. Jones and W. W. Keefe, Pittsburg; George Whyel and Fred C. Kneigley, Uniontown, and W. H. Clingerman, Scottsdale.

Accommodation train No. 146, on the Monongahela Division of the Pennsylvania Railroad, was wrecked at the south end of the Pan Handle Bridge over the Monongahela River. The engineer and fireman were seriously burned.

President of Select Council of Chester has received a letter from the Automobile Club of Philadelphia asking for the erection of erecting signboards at the principal corners in Chester containing information as to distances and directions.
The fast freight trade on the Reading Railway Company has shown a large increase during the past week. It now requires two and sometimes three trains to haul merchandise from Reading to this city.

Mrs. Alice Fahs, of Selingsgrove, has brought action against the York Bridge Company to recover \$25,000 damages for the death of her husband, who was killed by the breaking down of the false work used in the construction of the Millifinville Bridge at which time seven men met their death.

Commissioner Nellis has notified the anthracite coal operators that according to the prices of coal sold at tidewater the anthracite mine workers are to receive 6 per cent. above the basis for November.

Acting under special instructions from Judge J. Q. Van Swearingen, detectives and members of the State constabulary raided nineteen political and social clubs at Fayette City, near Pittsburg, and arrested nineteen persons on a charge of selling liquor illegally.
Thomas Limski, a white newsboy, was held up by two colored lads back of the police station at Chester in broad daylight and robbed of all the money in his possession. One of the colored youths threw a bag over Limski's head while the other rifled his clothing.

Records in Tunnel Boring.
"World's records in the tunneling line are being broken down in Los Angeles," said Henry Martin.

"The records are being broken in the construction of the great aqueduct which will bring the waters of the Owens River from the distant high Sierras to the city of Los Angeles. Several great tunnels are necessary. On the immense Elizabeth Lake bore 160 feet has been excavated during the last ten days, a world's record. The cost has been \$34.19 a foot, while the board of expert engineers estimated that \$75 a foot would be the lowest possible figure at which the work could be done. One mile of this tunnel is now completed.

"On the Gunnison tunnel 320 feet a month has been bored, which is considered extraordinary."—Milwaukee Sentinel.
