COMMRCIAL COLUMN

Weekly Review of Trade and Latest Market Reports.

R. G. Dun & Co.'s Weekly Review of Trade says:

Further significant improvements have been made in iron and steel, and as they form a great basic trade this goes far toward establishing the long desired readjustment of the whole industrial situation. This, and the better weather for both agricultural and mercantile interests, are the week's most important trade developments. A marked optimistic feeling therefore prevails in most branches of business in spite of the fact that the unsettling tariff debate continues, not having yet reached its last stage-that of the conference committee. The notable event of the week in cotton goods has been the reduction in staple prints, led by the leading producer. The declines prove to be more radical than anticipated, although opinions in the trade vary as to their probable duration.

Bradstreet's says:

Irregularity still characterizes the trade, crop and industrial situation. In industrial lines the consensus of reports is that further improvement has been registered, especially in the iron and steel, coal, coke, woolen manufacturing and leather trades. Building is active and lines of made catering to this industry are feeling beneficial effects. It is a betweenseasons period in wholesale and jobbing distributive trade; orders from retailers are merely of a filling-in character and hardly equal to exectations.


