Honey Crop \$20,000,000 A Year.

For a body of workers of which so little is seen by the public the bees of the United States are a highly desirable lot of producers, the value of their yearly store of honey being estimated by the United States Bureau of Entomology at \$20,000,000. Nor does that fix the limit of their usefulness, for their services in fertilizing the blossoms of fruit trees and plants are said to be worth even more than their honey.

It is unfortunate that this important non-trust industry should be subjected to regulation, but on account of the recent development of contagious diseases among bees it is recommended that apiculture be not popularized, but rather that it be confined to specialists having a sufficient financial stake in the business to insure proper attention to the health of the bees.—New York Mail.

COMMERCIAL

Weekly Review of Trade and Market Reports.

R. G. Dun & Co.'s Weekly Review of Trade says: The industrial and commercial situation as a whole, at the beginning of the last quarter of the year, is that of a full return to normal conditions. The Southern trade, it is reported, is better than for several seasons past. The chief flaw in the situation is to be found in the high prices, which serve to check operations in some directions, and are a conservative influence.

Business in steel rails is expanding and much activity is expected in this division next year, as the railroads are covering future requirements freely.

Sharp advances were made in cotton goods and yarns during the week and, while trading in wholesale dry goods markets was limited in the metropolitan district by the celebratory reports from other centers indicating the maintenance of a reasonable distribution. Some large interests are moving to cover their early spring needs in staple fabrics. A careful canvass of conditions in men's wear mills, following revisions and cancellations of orders disclosed that production was being curtailed, although an early revival in the demand for duplicate winter wear is expected to provide idle looms with work.
