COMMERCIAL

Weekly Review of Trade and Market Reports.

R. G. Dun & Co.'s Weekly Review of Trade says:

Overshadowing all other developments of the week is the advance in the Bank of England rate of discount to 5 per cent. As the advance to 5 per cent. about three years ago was, as it were, the raising of a storm signal, so the present advance is, as is said by Sir Felix Schuster, a sign of trade revival. Of course, there are special reasons, such as England's desire to protect her gold supply and the banking caution against the danger of overspeculation, but, in the large, the advance is a development of prosperity. In the United States every report of the week ranges from moderate improvement to extraordinary buoyancy. The advances from the leading cities are uniformly favorable, with especially brilliant reports from the Western centers. As against these accumulated and still accumulating evidences of trade expansion the two factors that speak for conservatism are the advancing prices and the danger that speculation may make such demands on the money market as to prematurely consume the free capital of the world required to finance a new era of prosperity.

Plans under consideration or already agreed upon for enlarging the capacity of producing plants testify to the very heavy volume of new business in iron and steel and further indicate that there is some pressure to secure an adequate supply of raw material.

Bradstreet's says: Trade and industrial developments are largely favorable. Continued cool weather continues to furnish a marked stimulus to demand for heavy wearing apparel, dry goods, clothing and shoes, and also benefits demand for hardware, groceries, lumber and building materials at retail in most markets. Demand for coal has also been perceptibly quickened, both for steam sizes and for household supplies.
