When the dogs saw the officers coming they rushed upon them and a fight ensued, in which eight of the beasts were shot, and the rest ran to the woods. since their owner died the howling of the dogs and their ferocity spread terror throughout the community and kept the people indoors at night. The rest of the pack will be killed as soon as possible.
