THE NEWS.

Domestic

Counsel for the Wardlaw slaters are moving to get the woman accused of the murder of Mrs. O. W. M. Snead released on the ground that morphine found in the woman's stomach indicates suicide.

The engineer of the freight train that ran into the rear end of the Montreal express on the New York Central has been held responsible for the death of Spencer Trask.

A vehicle containing Mrs. S. R. Break and infant plunged from a precipice into Blanco Canyon, Texas, causing instant death, after which the corpse was burned.

Frederick Mara, who discovered the process of making paper from wood pulp, and who had a factory in Baltimore, died near Utica, N. Y.

Ella Gingles, the Irish lace-maker who was found bound and gagged in a Chicago hotel has been married in Ireland.

Prof. George W. Yates, a widely known educator died in his ninety-second year at New Haven, Ct.

Rafaelo Pissano, a leader of the Black Hand, was sentenced to jail for 25 years by Judge Fawcett, of New York.

The present probe into the Beef Trust, it was said, in Chicago, was brought about by four members of the federal grand jury of 1908, who started an investigation at that time.

Lieut. H. W. Torney, U. S. A., arrested with Miss Inez Milholland at a meeting of the shirtwaist strikers in New York, was discharged by Magistrate Herrmann.

Alfred Wrook was hanged at Philadelphia for the murder of Emma Kurner, aged 17 years, whom he shot because she refused to marry him.

Yvonne Barr, aged 16, and Lina Ammer, aged 14, killed themselves at Des Moines, Iowa, because their parents opposed their marriage.

A case of scarlet fever has caused a postponement of the trial of Joseph M. Huston, at Harrisburg, in the State Capitol building.

Mrs. Edwina R. Hathaway, wife of Capt. Henry S. Hathaway, U. S. Signal Corps, obtained a divorce in New York.

Rear Admiral Nehemiah Mays Dyer, United States Navy, retired, died suddenly in Boston of cancer of the bowels.

Prof. J. E. Fould, of the University of Washington, says the new comet is showing signs of splitting in two.

George L. Marion, the New York theatrical man, was found guilty of murdering his wife at Wilkes-Barre, Pa.

An advance in the salaries of public school teachers in Chicago was voted by the Board of Education.

Four men were killed and three injured when a freight engine jumped the track near Titusville, Pa.

The proposed copper merger created a lively interest in Wall Street, and many rumors were doing the rounds.

Oliver Perin filed a petition in New York declaring that his brother, Lawrence Perin, is insane.

The federal government's prosecution of the publishers of the New York World was stopped by the Federal Court of New York. Judge Hough quashed the indictment against the Press Publishing Company, publishers of the World, for alleged libel in connection with publications concerning the Panama Canal purchase, on the grounds that the court was without jurisdiction.

Police are guarding the schoolhouse at Aspinwall, Pa., owing to a dispute between the school and health authorities over an epidemic of measles.

The principal copper producers of the United States are forming a single corporation with a capitalization of \$500,000,000.

Secretary of Agriculture Wilson declares that poor farming, and not the tariff, is to blame for the high prices of food.

Lawrence Perin is said to have spent \$75,000 in his recent trip to Spain, Morocco and Gibraltar.

Prof. Edward V. Reynolds, of the law school at Yale University, died from pneumonia.

The federal government began probing the Beef Trust in Chicago.

Foreign

The River Seine continues to rise and the city of Paris is filled with water above and below the surface. Sewers are bursting and streets sinking. It is expected the river will reach the maximum of the food today. Conditions in other parts of France are slightly improved.

Baron Komura, Japanese minister of foreign affairs, in an address to the Diet declared that the relations between Japan and the United States and Russia were constantly being strengthened, and that Japan's policy in Manchuria was directed toward the maintenance of the open door.

President Bowling, of the North Wales Miners Federation of New South Wales, was convicted at Sydney of obstructing work at the mines during the strike and sentenced to one year at hard labor in prison. Three other strike leaders were given sentences.

The Liberals are creeping up on the Unionists in the latest parliamentary elections in England, the parties now standing: Unionists, 258; Liberals, 253; Laborites, 40; Nationalists, 76.

The nonexistence of the United States that Germany admitted American means more freely in regard in German official quarters as simplifying pending tariff negotiations.

The elections to the Norwegian Storting, or Parliament, having been adverse to the ministry, Premier Knudsen submitted to the King the resignation of the cabinet.

President Madriz, of Nicaragua, has re-established the reign of terror instituted by Zelaya, and members of many prominent families have been imprisoned.

The municipality of Lima, Peru, bestowed medals on Mr. and Mrs. William Bryan.

The United States Banking Company, of Mexico City, Mexico, suspended payment.

COMMERCIAL

Weekly Review of Trade and Market Reports.

R. G. Dun & Co.'s Weekly Review of Trade says:

"The disturbances in Wall Street is apparently without effect on the industrial and trade situation, which, measured by best tests, continues in a healthy and active condition. A further perceptible broadening of demand for pig iron is noted at many leading centers, and in the matter of prices also the situation generally is more satisfactory to producing interests. In some districts new business is still light, but on the whole there is marked improvement, with basic and Bessemer grades attracting much attention. Irregularity is still apparent in finished lines and there is evidence that the railroads are holding back considerable new business, although car orders at the West are quite liberal and several large contracts are pending. Total sales of rails aggregated 40,000 tons, while about 18,000 tons of structural material were booked this week."
