COMMERCIAL

Weekly Review of Trade and Market Reports.

Bradstreet's says: "Trade still maintains the quiet undertone previously noted and not unusual by the way, at this season of the year, when buyers are gathering at leading markets in preparation for the opening of the spring campaign. Reports of buyers being numerous but of buying being conservative become largely from the leading Northern and Central Western market, prominent in this respect being New York, Boston, Philadelphia and Chicago. In the Northwest, Southwest, the South and on the Pacific Coast, reports are still highly optimistic, and liberal buying for spring is noted.

"Fears of a coal strike in the bituminous regions have led to heavy buying by railroads and manufacturers. Repression of railway buying of material is reported, based on a desire to see the course of legislation at Washington.

"Business failures in the United States for the week ended with February 10 were 249, against 232 last week, 211 in the like week of 1909, 326 in 1908, 204 in 1907 and 208 in 1906.

"Wheat, including flour, exports from the United States and Canada for the week aggregate 2,408,093 bushels, against 2,465,698 last week and 2,070,753 this week last year. Corn exports for the week are 1,135,908 bushels, against 1,240,860 last week and 1,281,349 in 1909.
