School Director a Violator.

The Indiana court was sustained by the superior court in a decision rendered in a case of the commonwealth vs. a school director in one of the school districts in the county. The director was charged and found guilty of violating the 65th section of the act of March 31, 1860, in furnishing labor, material, horses and wagons for the distribution of maps, books and supplies to the several schools of said district, and for the repairing of school house.

This section of the school law is violated to a greater or less extent by many school boards, and the outcome of this particular case is printed as a caution to boards wishing to conform their actions more closely to the letter and spirit of the law. School directors, like individuals, oftentimes violate laws for a long time without interference, but finally the law is invoked, and the violator must suffer the penalty.

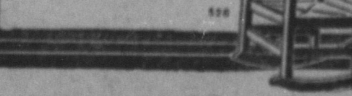
