

It is hard to believe that the government officials are correct when they announce there are 3,000,000 of so-called dope fiends in this country -that is to say, victims of some of the deadly drugs which most people know only by name. Cocaine, morphine and other such devastating drugs are being used in enlarged quantities, and recent venets in this city show how widespread their use is becoming. The use of these drugs can be suppressed only by maintaining a strict control over the sale of them. The worst feature of them all is that they are so insidious. When a man has accuired a desire for these drugs he will make almost any sacrifice to secure them. 




