

DEATHS.

Ephraim Bartholomew died at his home in Millheim, Tuesday of last week, aged sixty-nine years, ten months and twenty-one days. He had been in ill health for a number of years but recently he had a stroke of paralysis from the effects of which he died. He was a veteran of the Civil war and served his country faithfully until the close of the strife. He leaves to survive a widow and two daughters, Mrs. Agnes Corl, of State College, and Katie at home. Funeral services were held Friday forenoon, conducted by Rev. B. R. M. Sheeder and interment was made in Millheim.

Joseph S. Lee, a very highly respected citizen of Irvoia, Clearfield county, died Friday afternoon, 29th ult., from a complication of diseases.

Mr. Lee was a resident of Hublersburg for forty years. He was married in 1860 to Miss Martha E. Curran. At the outbreak of the Civil war Mr. Lee enlisted as a private in Company C, 148th regiment Penna. Volunteers and remained in the service until honorably discharged in 1865. Some years ago he moved to Irvoia, where he lived a retired life. He was the father of four sons; two of whom with his wife, survive. His body was interred in the South Fork cemetery.

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
