Since he is obliged to vacate the Gregg farm, west of Centre Hall, on account of the owner, Nelson Marshall, of Unionville, wishing to occupy it himself, John A. Heckman has some notion of looking up a farm in the eastern part of the state. Mr. Heckman is counted one of Potter township's best farmers, and made a success of the business where others failed.

During the past week at the homes of Mr. and Mrs. W. H. Meyer, in Centre Hall and W. H. Baird, west of town, were Mr. and Mrs. Wilbur Peters and family, of Downs, Kansas. They came east to attend the Dale-Thompson wedding, Mrs. Peters being a sister of the bride. It was thirty-one years ago that Mrs. Peters, shortly after the death of her husband Benjamin Peters, of Oak Hall Station, went to Kansas, with her two sons and a daughter. Mr. Peters, who is now east, is an extensive thoroughbred cattle grower, and is located on a three hundred acre farm, near Downs, and finds the business a very profitable one. Frank Peters, a brother, lives about thirty miles north of Downs, and Mrs. Van Hagen, a sister, is located about eight miles south of Downs, both of them on farms.

The next morning the cocks in the neighborhood crew with such strenuousity that Crawford's attention was attracted, when much to his surprise and chagrin, each cock-a-doodle-do was perched on poles with red-winged hens that could not for the world be told from his own, and now "Red Wing" has become wonderfully popular in Crawford's domain.
