





Wholesale trade and industry are quiet as a whole, the result partly of midsummer and holiday influences. and also because of the desire of buyers to await more definite information as to crop outcome. Retail trade, on the other hand has been rather more active, being stimulated by favorable weather, but despite this and clearance sales the volume of final distribution is not up to expectations.

Industry has felt the influence of lessened demand and midyear shutdowns for repairs, and less than normal time is being worked in the iron and steel, cottons. woolen, jewelry and in some sections coal-mining and flour-milling. Low water in the Northwestern streams is responsible for less doing in the output of lumber. The price movement shows considerable present strength, following very general declines in June, and the cereals and cotton are higher on the week. Collections feel the influence of quiet trade in reports of only fair payments.



### Moisture And Crop Production.

A paper read at a recent meeting in Winnipeg states that omitting evaporation from 200 to 400 tons of water are required in producing one ton of dry matter. In he growing of crops it is estimated that, including evaporation, from 3.6 inches to 4.3 inches of water are required to produce 12 bushels of wheat or 20 bushels of barley per acre.

ceeded 2,000,000 cases in July. Receipts of eggs have not been greatly in excess of those of last year. ceipts for the last two months have ever before in this country. been 2,417,000 cases, while in the 000 cases were received. The storage

of eggs began in April. The best grades of eggs going into storage are quoted at twenty-three

cents a dozen in car lots. They are Western eggs, and two years ago similar grades were sold at eighteen cents. Fresh Eastern eggs, which are now quoted at twenty-four to twenty-seven cents a dozen in the wholesale markets, were sold for twenty-five cents a year ago.

All the egg prices will be increased, the dealers say, by the warehouse expenses, interest charges and profit when the eggs are taken from the warehouses for consumption next fall and winter.

The total amount of butter now in storage in the metropolitan district warehouses is placed at 83,820,000 A year ago the total was pounds. 23,788,000 pounds. The receipts of butter in the last two months have amounted to 570,000 tubs of sixty pounds each: last year's total receipts in the two months was 520,000 tubs.

The best grades of butter, called "specials," were quoted at twenty nine and a quarter cents wholesale which is two and three-quarter cents a pound more than a year ago.


