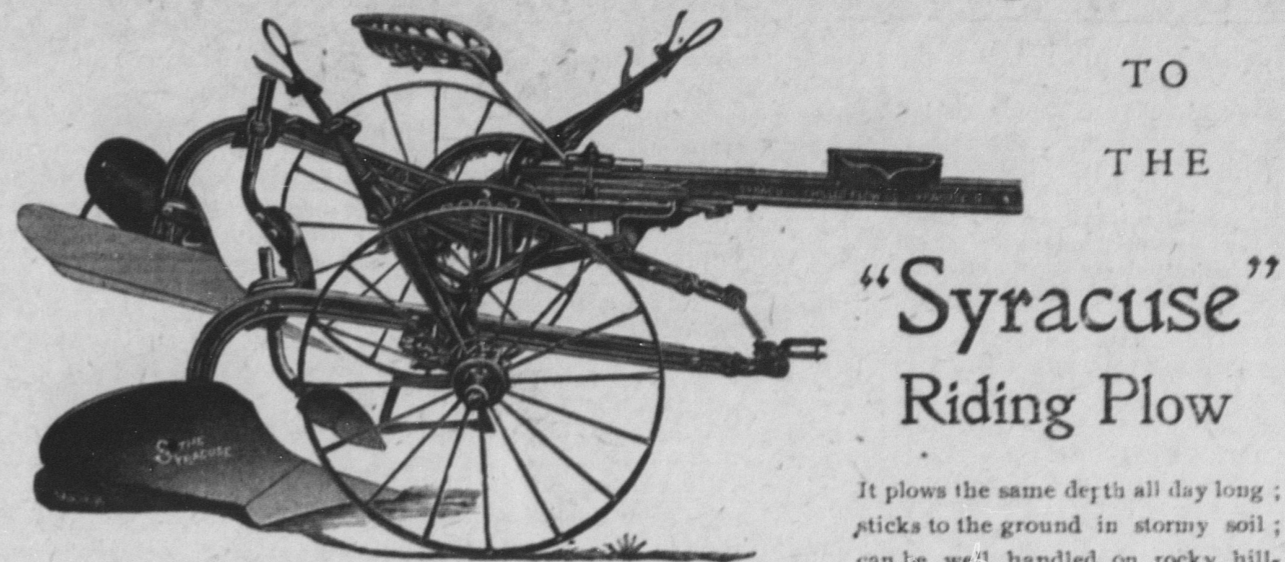
Charles Dale, of the Branch, transacted business here on Monday.

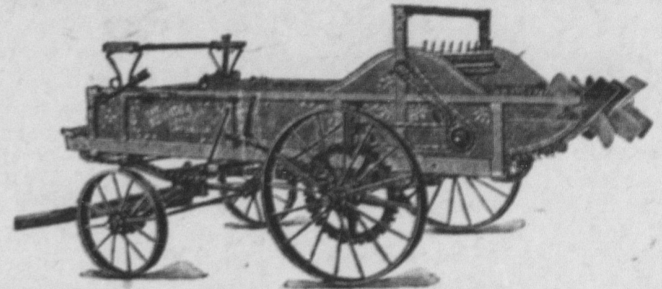

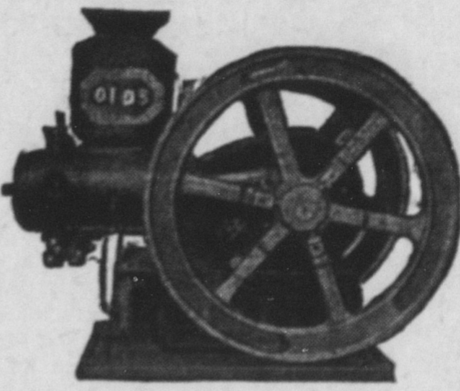
