A petition is being circulated to vacate what is termed the "old road" across Nittany Mountain. This road branches from the Brush Valley road at the Heckman farm, west of Centre Hall, and intersects the Gregg road also branching from the Brush Valley road, at the Gregg farms. The road in question is about a mile and a half in length.
