Henry Emerick died at his home in Centre Hall early Monday morning. He had been ill during the greater part of the time of the last year, suffering from a complication of diseases due largely to his advanced age, which was seventy-six years, nine months and five days. Interment was made at Centre Hall, Wednesday morning, Rev. B. F. Bieber officiating. He was the last of the brothers and sisters to survive.

The deceased is survived by a widow, nee Catharine Weaver, seven of ten children, namely, J. Frank, Penn Hall; Harvey H., Charles City, Iowa; Samuel S., in State of Washington; George, North Angle, California; Newton E., Altoona; Benjamin H., Centre Hall; Howard, Minnesota, Montana.

Mr. Emerick was a member of the Spring Mills lodge of Knights of the Golden Eagle, and during his illness drew benefits from that order. The order buried their brother, and was largely represented at the funeral, marching in double column ahead of the hearse. The body also had a guard of six. 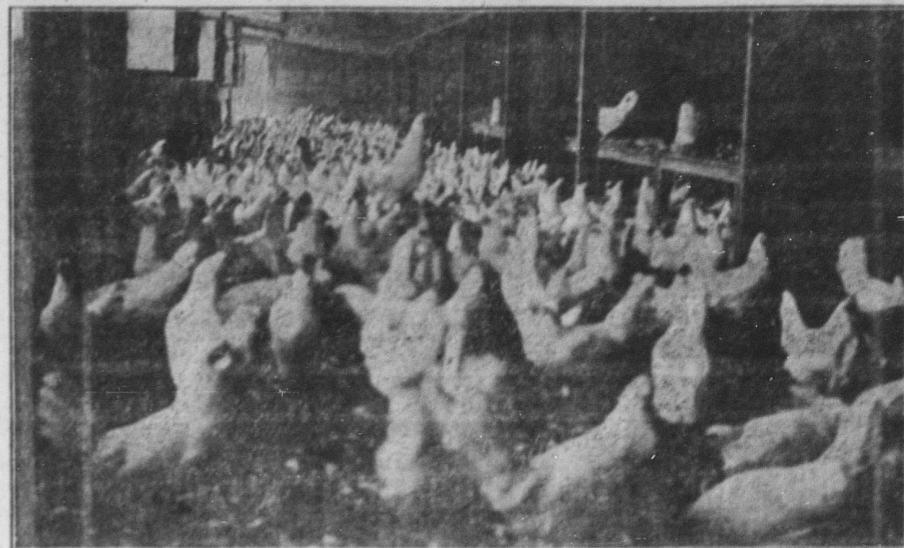
