HOW TO SELECT BULBS

Use of Oil Heaters in Orchards Will Overcome Destructive Atmospheric Conditions.

The fruit grower from time immemorial has been at the mercy of the elements. Frost is one of the most formidable foes with which he has to contend. Millions of dollars are lost annually by silent, relentless frosts that come either when the trees are in blossom or just after the fruit has set. Recent demonstrations in the fruit district of the Middle West have proved beyond a peradventure that damage to fruit trees by frost can be controlled to a greater or less extent. One of the fundamental principles

that underlie successful frost fighting is a knowledge of the subject of air drainage. Cold air, like water, settles to the lowest ground, and anything that will break up this stratum of cold air and cause it to mix with the upper strata of warm air will prove of great value in combating frost injury.

Frost injury to fruit trees most frequently occurs when there is a clear, still, dry atmosphere, and when the radiation is uninterrupted by clouds or moisture, and the cold air settles in poorly air-drained areas.

While frosts may not be severe, they are often just severe enough to damage the blossoms and tender fruits and they not only reduce a crop of fruit one-third to one-half of what it should be, but sometimes destroy the entire crop for one year or for several successive years.

In orchard heating the fuel to be depended upon must be easy to light, a fuel that will burn a long time and that will give out a great amount of heat; it must also be easily controlled in regard to temperature. Oil, in some forms, doubtless best meets these requirements, but where oil is scarce and coal abundant the latter would be the cheaper fuel.

The oil heater, so far as we know, was first manufactured by a firm in Fresno, Cal. Since then several styles of oil heaters have been manufactured and put on the market. One of these well known and extensively used orchard oil heaters, constructed on scientific principles, has a centerdraft tube that feeds oil to the flames, promotes combustion, and makes good use of the oil. The heater holds about five quarts of oil, will burn six or seven hours, is made of 28-gauge iron, and weighs, with cover, 1 1/2 pounds. It stands 11 inches high.

The cover is made to fit like a lamp lid, and is raised in the center so as to shed water. This heater has successfully stood the test of several years. It is successful because based on the principle that there is no need for great heat locally, but for numerous small fires well distributed. The small fires do not necessarily change the direction of the air draft, the object being to warm up the draft as it is pressed down from above by the settling of the colder air, and thus avoid the forming of cold spots or pools. Above the danger point the upper air strata are warmer, and usually a few degrees of rise in temperature is all that is necessary for safety.

An oil heater that will hold 7 quarts of oil will burn ten hours. This heater is so arranged that the heat may be increased or diminished at will. There are larger heaters that hold six gallons of oil and burn thirty-five hours, but the medium size is deemed best for all practical purposes.

Pear Orchard in Sod.

The pear orchard will do best when allowed to grow up in sod. Slow and hardy growth in sod makes pear trees more resistant to disease. Bluegrass makes a good sod for the pear orchard.

Don't Forget the Nasturtium.


While ordering seeds do not forget to procure nasturtium, poppy, portulaca or salvia seeds for the beds exposed to the sun's scorch all day.

USEFUL SUPPORT FOR PLANT

Can Be Put to Good Advantage Both With Flowers and Vegetables—Height Can Be Adjusted.

The accompanying picture shows a support for plants which can be used to good advantage both for vegetables and flowers. It is a patented article, but the cost is so small it would not pay to attempt to imitate it, says Park's Floral Magazine.

It is made of galvanized wire, which will not rust, and can be raised and lowered to suit the plant. It is shipped knocked down, but is easily put together and will not fall apart after once put up. When not in use it can

be packed, oiled and put away for the next season. It can be used for training tomatoes, carnations, roses or any flowers that need support.

PREVENT INJURY BY FROST

Pick Out Those That Are Firm to Touch—Larger Ones Often Lacking in Germinating Power.

In buying bulbs it is not always wise to pick out the largest. In imported bulbs the number of flowers each spike will bear is generally determined by the cultivation the bulbs have received in the nurseries.

In selecting bulbs, always pick out those that are firm to the touch, because the larger ones are often lacking in germinating powers.

Pot bulbs in good soil, then put them away until they have made a good start in root-growth. This re-

quires at least two months, and there is no use being disappointed if they do not come out sooner.

Protect Trees From Animals.

Trees may be protected from injury by rabbits and mice, says the North Dakota experiment station, by keeping litter away from them and painting the trunk with whitewash to which Paris green has been added. They may also be protected by wire screens.

Order Early.

Order seeds, plants and nursery stock early and secure the varieties you want, the best stock and exactly what you ask for.

HORTICULTURAL NOTES

Sow wood ashes broadcast in the orchard.

Norway maple grows very readily from seed.

A warm, rich, well drained soil is best for the grape.

Almost all vines should be planted at least eight feet apart.

The disk is better than the plow in the orchard for breaking up sod.

Under favorable conditions the black walnut is a tree that is easily grown.

It is a mistake to neglect an orchard when it is not producing a crop of fruit.

In grading up, the chickens, only those that are most vigorous should be considered.

Rub off the water sprouts of a tree as soon as they appear. You can do it with your fingers.

The man who makes a success of poultry keeping is the man who starts with the right aim.

A variety of vegetables may be grown between the rows of apple trees if the owner so desires.

The Kieffer pear and the Ben Davis apple have been so often condemned that it is a relief to hear now and then a word to their credit.

Do not allow the water in which plants and bulbs are grown to become sour or they will suffer. Change it often and keep a few pieces of charcoal in it.

Officials of the forest service are authority for the statement that injury to forest trees by insects cause the people of the United States an annual loss of \$100,000,000.

Remember that nothing "just happens." Everything has its money or labor, and no beautiful home grounds can be expected from haphazard methods of embellishing the home.

Spraying against the plum tree-cuckoo is only partially successful, and the same may be said of other snout boring beetles which injuriously affect fruit, namely, the quince and the apple evreculo and plum gougers.

THE NEWS OF PENNSYLVANIA

Reading. — Entering the Portovania cigar factory, where his wife was employed, Wilmer W. Burkholder, a horseman, shot her in the presence of fellow-workmen, because she would not return to him. He then fired two bullets into his own head, dying soon afterward. The tragedy caused a panic in the neighborhood, the five shots alarming not only the hands employed on the third floor, but also those of two hosier plants on an upper floor, and the audience assembling in two theatres nearby. Both were taken to the Homeopathic Hospital, where the husband died an hour later. The woman, who was 35 years old and pretty, regained consciousness for a short time, but did not refer to the tragedy before passing away. She refused to make any statement.

Tamaqua.—While Alice Hyland, aged 19 years, was on her way from Brockton to Tuscarora to attend a dance, she was met by Michael Millick, her sweetheart, with whom she had quarreled several days ago. Millick called her away from a girl and after a few words drew a revolver and commenced firing. Two of the shots took effect and the girl fell mortally wounded. Millick then fled. The girl's companion hastened to Tuscarora, where she procured aid. When several men reached the scene the girl was dead. State police are scouring the woods.

Wilkes-Barre.—Thomas Simpson, a well-known miner, aged 35 years, was stabbed to death by his board-house keeper, Andrew Flynn, aged 41 years at the latter's home on Kidder Street. Flynn who is under arrest, declares that Simpson, who is a powerful man, came home intoxicated and started an argument. Flynn ordered him to leave the house, but this only angered Simpson, who closed the door of the room they were in. He then chased Flynn all over the room, until the latter was forced to stab him with a pocketknife.

Pottsville. — Mr. and Mrs. John Kossavage, the parents of the five children, aged from two months to eight years, who were burned to death New Year's morning in a fire at Minersville which destroyed their home, were held responsible for the death of the little ones by a Coroner's Jury which conducted an inquest. They could give no satisfactory explanation of the fire's origin or why they did not make an attempt to save the children or notify the firemen that they were in the house.

Pittsburg. — Pittsburg could use the Pied Piper. The city is now overrun with rats and there is \$1,000,000 of Pittsburg money ready for the man who will invent something which will exterminate rats quietly and effectively. H. C. Evert, a patent attorney, has been called in to consultation by some of the large business men, who each suffer the loss of thousands of dollars each month by rats.

Chester.—William H. Albany, a policeman, was dismissed from the police force by Chief of Police McCarey, acting under instructions from Mayor Johnson, as a result of the policeman's alleged implication in a private hearing given to a Po-lander in one of the police watch boxes.

Corry.—Paul Phelps and his companion, Miss Mary Stevens, were thrown into twelve feet of water in Columbus pond, when thin ice collapsed under their weight. Phelps slung to the edge of the ice and was rescued unconscious. The girl drifted away under the ice before aid could reach her. Her body was recovered.

Lewistown.—Fire of incendiary origin destroyed a large house owned by Dr. Nettie Knepp. This is the fifth incendiary fire to occur in this city within a few months and the second time this building has been set on fire. Firemen report finding cotton waste soaked in oil and four turpentine cans in the hallway.

Lancaster.—John A. Snyder, one of the best known residents of this city, died unexpectedly at his home from acute indigestion. He was 68 years of age.

Johnstown.—Placing a stick of dynamite in his mouth and lighting the fuse, Steve Zoller, a miner of Sonman, ended his life. Zoller was blown thirty feet, and the rear of the house was wrecked.

Easton.—Gamble Young, aged 80, member of the city Board of Tax Revision, was stricken with apoplexy during a meeting of the board and died two hours later.

Shenandoah.—After being a fugitive from justice since August 1, 1903, Jacob Harris, 30 years old, was arrested here Sunday, as one of the alleged murderers of John Domesky, 19 years old, who was attacked on the street and stabbed. Harris was committed without bail.

Reading.—Reading is to have a new Y. M. C. A. building and it is to coat in the neighborhood of \$200,000. The directors and trustees decided upon this at a recent meeting and a call for subscriptions similar to the one issued in Philadelphia
