CARING FOR THE "DRY" COWS

Corn ensilage adds palatability and succulence to the ration and makes it easier to masticate and digest than dry fodder.

The silo is also a great saver of labor and barn room and four tons of corn ensilage can be stored in the space occupied by one ton of hay.

The dairyman who is without a silo to provide succulence during the winter months is certainly up against a hard proposition.

The presence of numerous buyers in the principal markets has tended to produce a moderate degree of improvement in house trade, and early farm work is progressing under favorable conditions, while fall-grown grain appears to be in good shape. Incidentally the progress of the season has imparted a little more zest to retail trade. Yet conservatism is everywhere visible; buyers, especially of textiles and clothing, are purchasing cautiously and mill owners are selling goods made up from highpriced materials at little or no profit.
