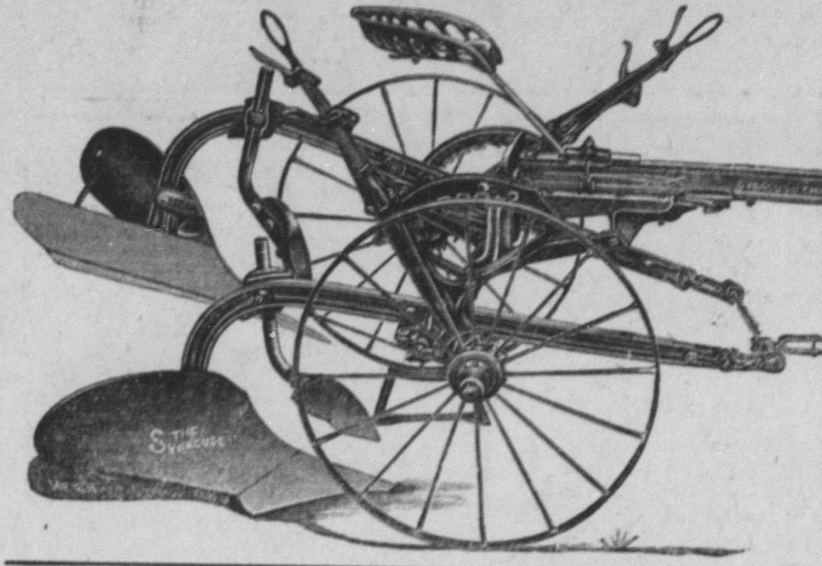

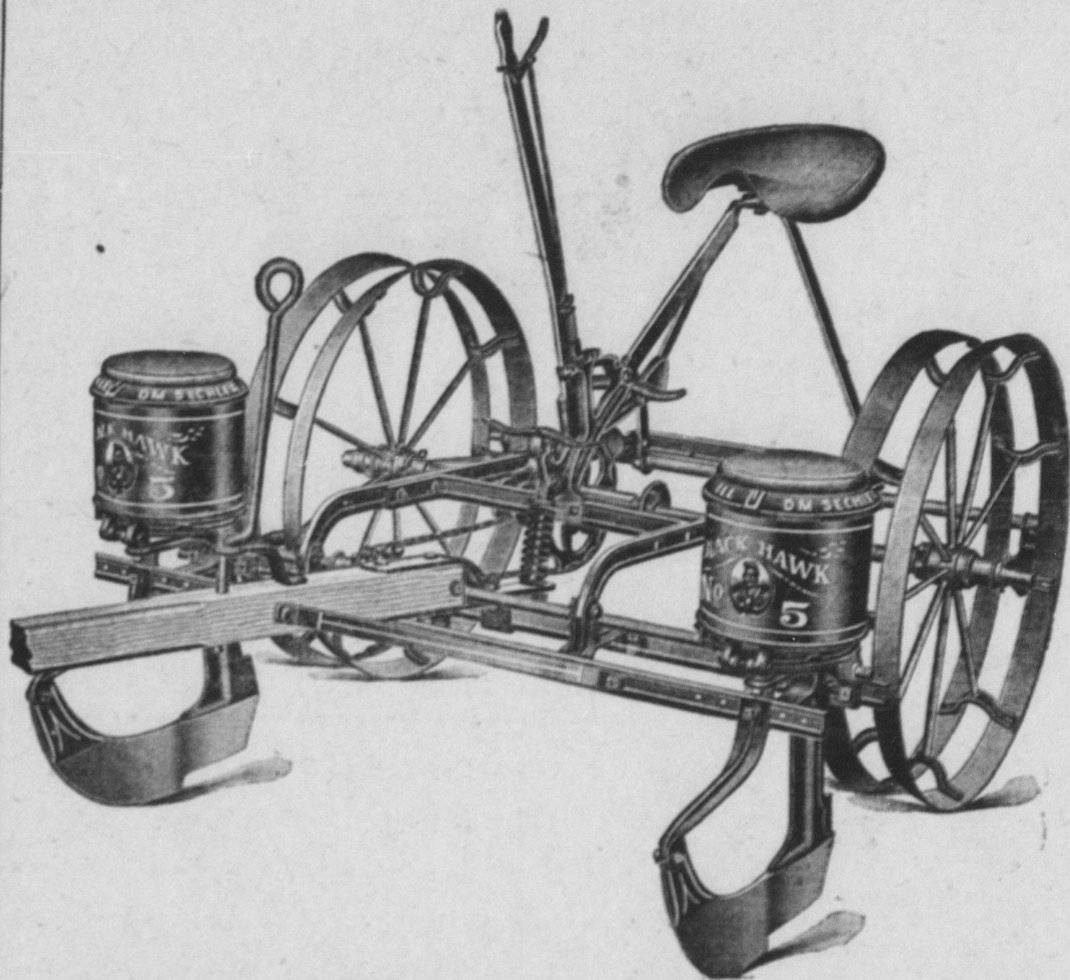

Planter regularly furnished with tongue, and 5 sets of seed plates.

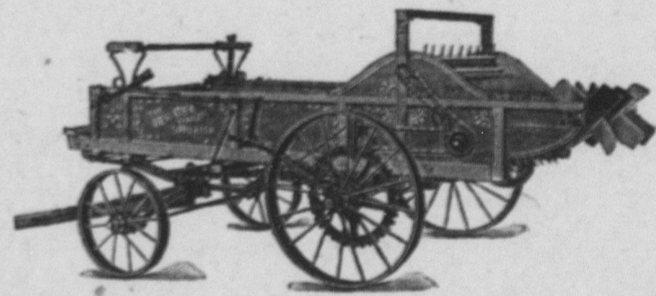
