The afternoon session will be given over to local talent—ministers and laymen—and the evening session will be occupied by Miss Robinson, a state field worker, under the state's Sabbath-school association. 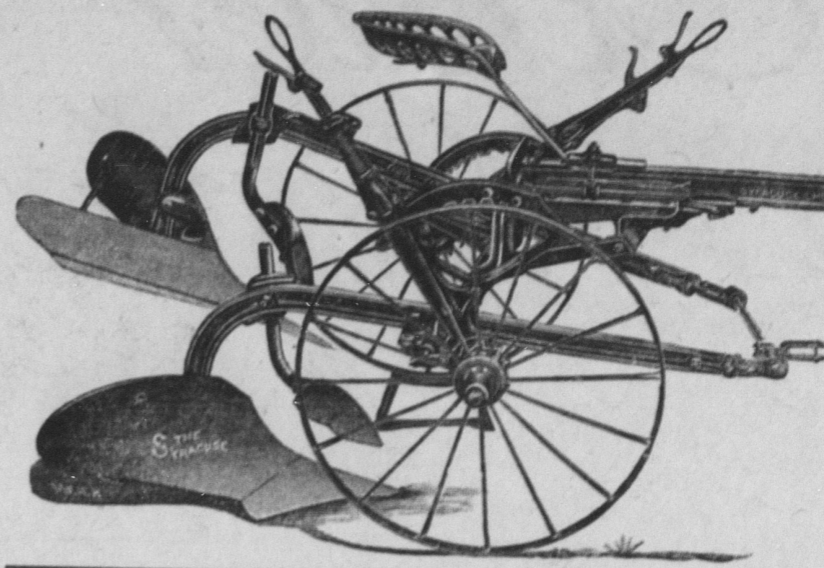

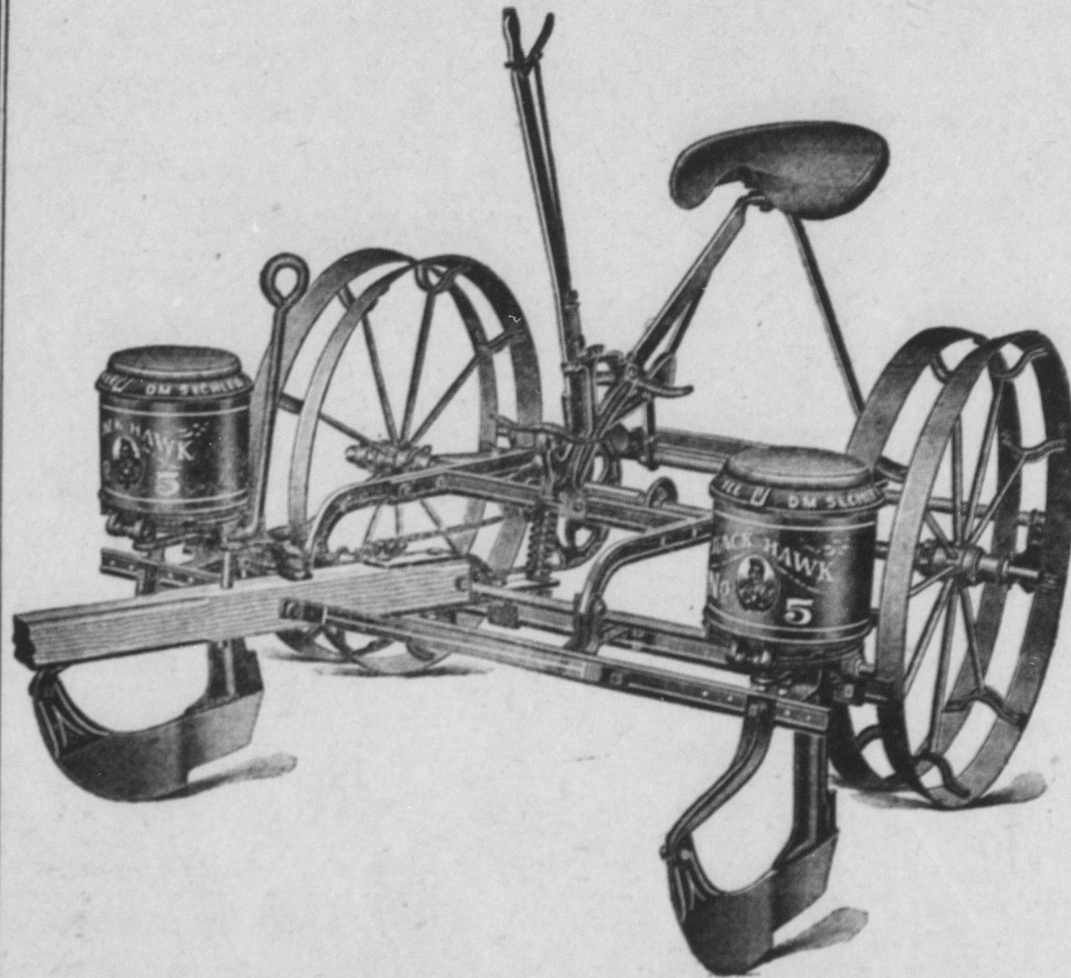

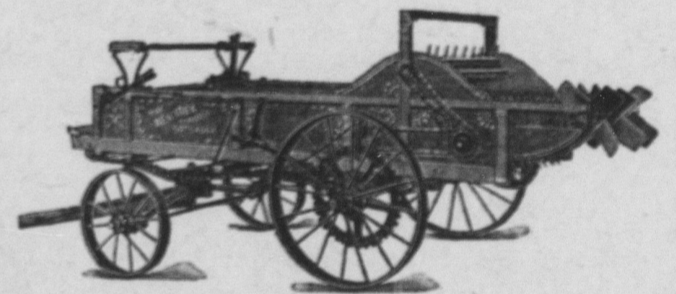
