## LABORLEADERHEAD **OF DESPERATE GANG**

21 DEATHS LAID TO HIM.

Charged With Complicity in Los Angeles Times Explosion--Labor Headquarters Raided--Officers Hint at "Plant."

### Case in a Nu shell.

The detectives believe they are on the track of the gang of dynamiters who blew up the Llewelyyn Iron Works in Californa; a large bridge at Springfield, Ill.; the court house at Omaha, Neb.; the offices of Contractors Caldwell and Drake, of Columbus, Ind.; the telephone exchange and three other buildings in Indianapolis.

The arrest of McNamara was made during a meeting of the executive officers of the union. All the officials were taken to a police station and the headquarters of the union searched.

Later the detectives found seventeen sticks of dynamite and two quarts of nitroglycerin in a barn, where it was said to have been placed by McNamara.

The detectives also found in the basement of the building containing the offices of the International Union, 64 sticks of dynamite, 200 feet of fuse, 500 dynamite caps and 12 alarm




