School Board Code Signed.

Governor Tener approved the school code and it took effect at once, except where otherwise provided. The information that it had been signed was communicated to the House while in session, and received with applause. The Governor used several pens in signing the bill and they will be presented to Senator E. L. Tustin, who presented the measure in the Senate, State Superintendent of Public Instruction Schaeffer and Dr. G. M. Pnilips, of West Chester, a member of the School Code Commission. Dr. Philips was present when the code was signed.

Small-Pox Among Foes Of Vaccination.

The State Health Department received information that smallpox had broken out near Waynesboro, Franklin county. This town has been a stronghold of the anti-vaccinationists and Commissioners of Health Dixon has recommended general vaccination. Two cases of smallpox were diagnosed as chicken-pox by a local physician and the reports to the department show that a number of people have been in contact with them.
