

ZEIGLER REUNION.

Family Clan From Centre and Clinton Counties at Hecla.

The Zeiglers of Centre and Clinton counties held their reunion at Hecla Park Monday, with a large attendance. W. C. Heinle, of Bellefonte, made a speech bearing on their early history, their immigration from Germany to Pennsylvania, long before the revolution, and their patriotic spirit in the war for independence.

"Zeigler is a German trade name and means a tileburner. There were twenty-five Zeigler male immigrants to Pennsylvania before the revolution. Several members of that name located in York county, long before the revolution. The York county Zeiglers were very patriotic in the war for independence, and a dozen of them served in the American army.

"In 1818 Peter Zeigler, son of Nicholas Zeigler, immigrated from York to Centre county, and permanently located on what is now known as the Benjamin Lambert farm in Brush Valley, and raised a family of thirteen children. Daniel W. Zeigler, of Spring Mills, who makes his home with his son C. F. Zeigler, is the only one of these children surviving."

DEATHS

After suffering from a disease of a cancerous nature for a period of fifteen years, during much of which time she was totally disabled, Mrs. Jacob Walker died on Tuesday afternoon at her home west of Centre Hall. She bore her affliction without complaint, and died without a struggle, simply sleeping away. Her mind was quite clear at all times. The funeral will be held Friday at ten o'clock at the house, Rev. Murray, pastor of the church of Messiah, officiating. Interment will be made at Centre Hall.

Before her marriage Mrs. Walker's name was Mary Eckley. She was born at Pine Glenn, this county, just ten days over seventy-five years ago. She lived all the time at Pine Glenn until seven years ago when the Walker family moved to near Centre Hall. All of her married life was spent on the two farms owned by them at the points indicated.

The deceased was the mother of ten children, six of whom survive, namely: Mrs. S. T. Hoover, Pine Glenn; Mrs. John Isley, Altoona; Benner and William S., Centre Hall; Jackson S., Cripple Creek, Colorado; Simon, Snow Shoe. One sister, Mrs. Jefferson Bechtol, of Altoona, also survives.

The following is from the Lewis-ton Gazette of last week: "The remains of Miss Mary Olive Tate, who died at Southern Pines, N. C., where she had gone but a few days previous to her decease in the hope of relief from tuberculosis, arrived here accompanied by her father, E. Potter Tate, of Centre county, Sunday by train and were conveyed by Undertaker Fretz to the home of her brother, George C. Tate, at Yeagertown, where funeral services were conducted by Rev. Dr. Spangler Monday evening at 7:30 o'clock. Next day the body was taken by train to Bellefonte, where the interment took place in Buffalo Run cemetery. The young lady was in the 21st year of her age."

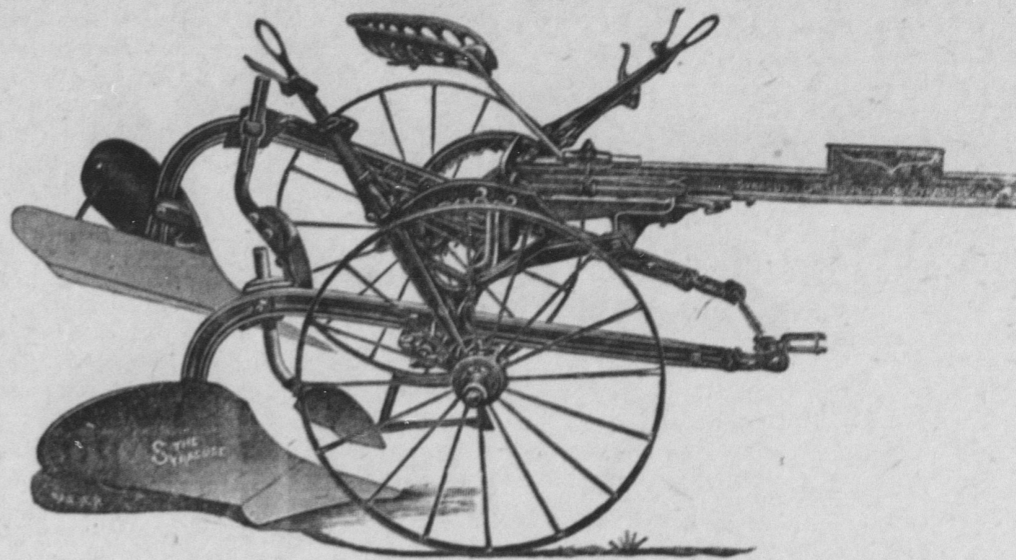

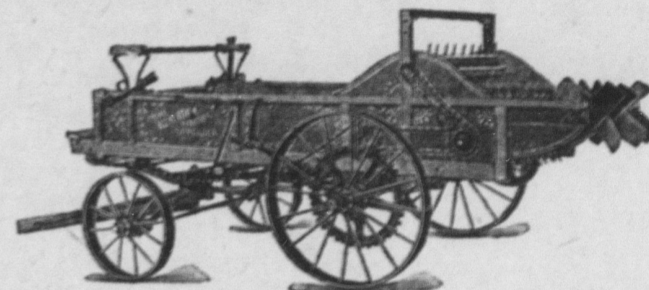

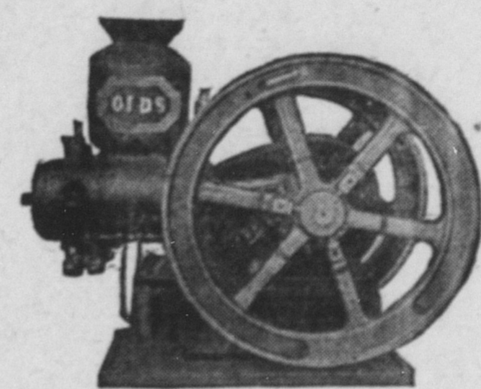
