The subject of this sketch, Rachel Munger Fredericka, wife of H. H. Fredericka, was born in Heines township, May 5th, 1833; was baptized in infancy and early in life connected herself with the Evangelical Lutheran church of which she continued to be a consistent member until the time of her death. She was united in marriage to Mr. Fredericka, of Union county, the 14th day of October, 1852. To this union were born two children, Alice, who died at the age of two years, and Sarah, who died at the age of five years. Mrs. Fredericka was the last to survive of a family of nine children.

For more than fifty years Mr. and Mrs. Fredericka had lived in Boalsburg, and they had been married almost fifty-nine years.

Mrs. Fredericka departed this life on Wednesday, August 30th, and was buried September 2nd, interment being made in the Boalsburg cemetery, Rev. J. I. Stonecypher officiating. She is survived by her husband, now in his 82nd year.

Mr. and Mrs. Lingle were married over three years ago, and for several years lived at Sunbury. They had no children.
