TAFT DIGS WITH GOLDEN SPADE

Breaks Ground For Panama Exposition.

OVER 100,000 CHEER HIM

Never-to-be-Forgotten Scenes in the Golden Gate Park—All San Francisco in a Delirium Of Excitement.

San Francisco.—More than 100,000 people massed in the Golden Gate Stadium Saturday to see President Taft turn the shovel of earth that broke the ground for the site of the Panama-Pacific Exposition of 1915.

At 10 o'clock the President began his parade from the city. Every military post for miles along the Pacific Coast had been ransacked for its troops and its bands and every battleship of the Pacific fleet near San Francisco supplied a quota of its crew for the parade.

When the President appeared at the stadium four bands from all the corners of the grounds struck up Hall to the Chief. Before the President was seen the crowd had caught the meaning of the tune, and when Mr. Taft stepped onto the platform the hillsides before him presented acre upon acre of swaying, cheering humanity. They were a crowd of a festival city on a day of exceptional festivity, and a word set them cheering.

Madame Nordica, who sang at the ground-breaking exercises, rode in an automobile just behind the President. When she appeared upon the stand the people showed their holiday spirit by the ovation they gave her. Then the voice of Madame Nordica rose over the crowd. She sang without accompaniment some simple English song. The crowd listened to her intently.

By the time the President arose to speak the enthusiasm was at fever heat. It was a hard task that he had before him when he began to tell them of the enormous task of construction the Panama Canal really was. He spoke of its history and then of its future significance to the people of California and the whole west coast of the country. He concluded by tacitly admitting that it was true that he wanted the people of California to have the exposition.

When the President finished speaking the Golden spade with which he was to turn the earth was handed him. He walked down from the platform to the hillside and with his smile at its broadest set his substantial foot upon the spade. The hillside tipped and fought to catch a glimpse of him. He gave a shove and the spade sank into the ground. He lifted the shovel full of earth before the crowd and they took up their cheering with renewed vigor. The dirt was laid finally in a silver and gold-mounted case.

A soldier handed the President the halyards of the exposition flag. The band struck up the Star-Spangled Banner. Madame Nordica stepped forward on the platform and led the crowd in the singing. The President halted, had over hand and the banner of San Francisco's hope for 1915 was run to the masthead.

Madame Nordica was not allowed to finish the song. Cannon on the hill sides about the stadium crashed out a salute of twenty-one guns. The battle-ships in the harbor caught the salute and their big guns boomed an echo to the salute. Three hundred pigeons, 200 white doves and 100 carrier pigeons were released from baskets.

JUSTICE HARLAN DEAD.

Last Words Characteristic Of the Man.

Washington.—Associate Justice John Marshall Harlan, ranking member of the United States Supreme Court both in age and seniority of service, dean of living American jurists, a foremost authority on the Constitution and prominent in the councils of the Presbyterian Church, died of acute bronchitis at his home at Fourteenth and Euclid streets, Saturday morning.

He was 78 years old on June 1 last and had served 33 years, 10 months and 15 days on the Supreme Bench. This span of service has only been excelled by those of John Marshall and Joseph Story, each of whom served a fraction over 34 years.

Despite his advanced age he was robust in health until Monday, when he developed a severe cold and on the following day it developed into acute bronchitis.

Justice Harlan was conscious to the end and his parting words to his family were: "Good-by. I am sorry I have kept you all waiting so long."

Bronze Tablet Unveiled.

Harrisburg, Pa.—A bronze tablet marking the site of Camp Curtin, the great mobilization camp for Pennsylvania troops during the Civil War, was unveiled here Saturday in the presence of a large number of people, including veterans of the war, members of patriotic societies and school children. The tablet was the gift of the Harrisburg Chapter, Daughters of 1812, and marks the center of the camp. An oration was delivered by Adjutant General Thomas J. Stewart.

COMMERCIAL

Weekly Review of Trade and Market Reports.

Bradstreet's says:

Though a relatively liberal volume of road sales came out this week, the probabilities are that trade as a whole has receded a little from last week. This tendency is perhaps due to the fact that buyers, having covered their urgent requirements, have again become cautious about future commitments. In other words, they seem to prefer to let demand catch up with their stocks before again entering the markets.

However, the developments of the week show that staple articles continue in comparatively good demand, allowances being made for the fact that losses have occurred in some sections, while gains have been made in others. As it is, satisfactory orders are noted for most lines of dry goods, shoes, clothing, hardware, groceries and kindred lines, though purchases of cotton goods are being made along conservative lines, primarily because of the recessions in raw cotton prices.

Strikes of railway shopmen and clerks in the West and South cloud the industrial situation and hamper traffic in the sections affected and result in some repair work being turned over to car-building plants.

Hillocks of Vegetables. At this time of the year farmers are busy making miniature mountains on their holdings, mountains that will be scattered over the countryside before the winter is over.

The mountains in question are those formed of vegetable produce that must be kept for several months, and go as occasion requires. Potatoes, beet-root, carrots and turnips are raised from the ground in September and stored.

The farmer calls his hillock of vegetables a "clump." He makes it on a piece of high ground near the homestead, so that it may not be flooded, and many a big grower has clumps a quarter of a mile long.

First, a shallow ditch is dug on the piece of land selected. The base of this is lined with straw, and upon the straw the roots are heaped up firmly and carefully, till they resemble an elongated cone.

Over the sides of the cone more straw is laid, and on that again earth or, better still, turfs, with their grassy sides inwards. Bricks will not keep out frost, but straw will, and a well-made clump is frost proof and also damp proof.

To Farm on Copper Lands.

A party of Houghton capitalists have under consideration the establishment at a point on the Copper Range railroad south of Houghton of a 600-acre experimental farm. The lands have already been secured, but are at present heavily timbered.

Steps will be taken during the coming winter to cut the timber, and early next spring the stumps will be removed and the land made ready for cultivation. It is hardly probable that crops will be planted before 1913, but the enterprise when established will prove one of the biggest from an agricultural standpoint in the copper country.—Michigan Manufacturer.
