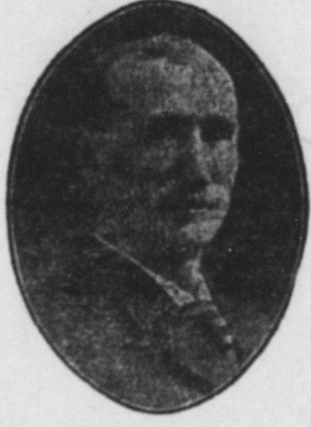
Make whatever excuse they will, the commissioners have soaked the county for an indebtedness infinitely larger than was ever dreamed of by any one who attended that memorable gathering...
