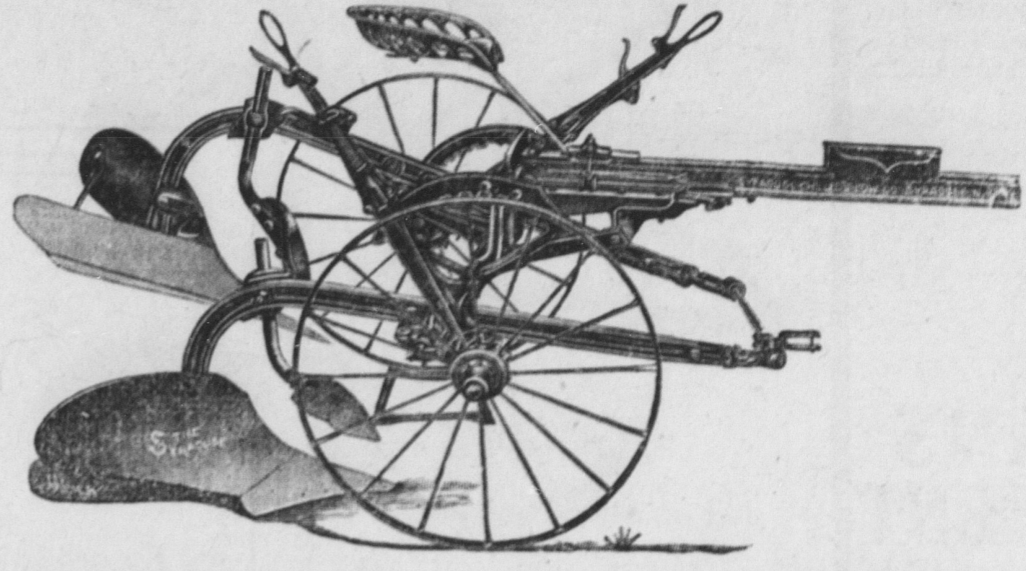

Linden Hall. James I. Ross lost one of his horses on Monday. Mrs. Sara Stine, of Annville, is visiting her mother Mrs. Campbell.

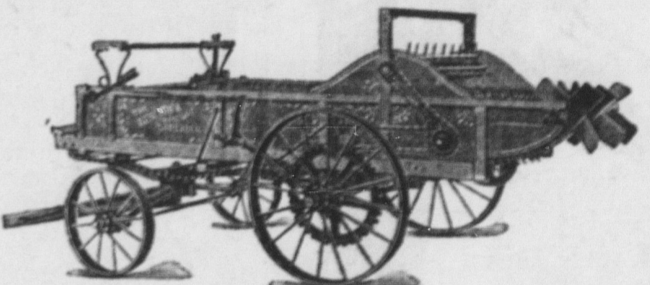
