

THE NEWS OF PENNSYLVANIA

Mount Joy.—Christian H. Becker, a prominent farmer, of East Lampeter Township, died at the age of 53 years. He is survived by three children.

Chester.—Becoming emmeshed in the bed coverings, Joseph Dodds, infant son of Mr. and Mrs. Thomas Dodds, was smothered to death.

Canonsburg.—James M. Collins, a well-known business man and candidate for borough auditor, was found dead at his desk with a bullet in his brain.

Harrisburg.—George Harris, who placed obstructions on Northern Central Railroad tracks in this county last summer, was sent to an insane hospital.

Chester.—A darned needle almost three inches in length, which had been in his body since he was a boy, was taken from the back of Edward Morris, a resident of Marcus Hook.

York.—A corps of surveyors is busy surveying between this city and the Maryland line for a State road. The survey follows the old York and Chanceford pike through Dallastown, Red Lion, Peachbottom township and Delta.

Reading.—Augustus Gresh, a wealthy retired farmer, of Gilbertsville, this county, was found dead in bed. He was eighty-three years of age. Apoplexy was the cause of death.

Reading.—Raymond Gilmore, a fifteen-year-old boy, accidentally shot himself while examining a loaded revolver. The bullet entered his head above the right eye and came out above the left eye.

Kittanning.—Mrs. Mary Lehner died in a hospital here as the result of a wound received when her brother-in-law, Douglass Quinn, accidentally discharged the gun he was cleaning preparatory to a hunting expedition.

Waynesboro.—Petitions are being circulated in Greene, Franklin and Fayette counties, asking President Taft to pardon J. B. F. Rinehart, former cashier of the Farmers and Drovers' National Bank, of this place, who is serving a fifteen-year term in the Western Penitentiary for wrecking the institution.

Lebanon.—Dr. John J. Light, upon responding to a hurry call to an up-town drug store, was startled to find that his services as county coroner and not his skill as a physician was required in the case of Mrs. Albert Beyerle, of Anville. The doctor was asked to stop a nose hemorrhage and then found that the patient had died from a hemorrhage of the lungs. She had been shopping.

Punxsutawney.—Eight miners are believed to have been killed in the Adrian shaft of the Rochester and Pittsburgh Coal and Iron Company's mine, located four miles from here, as a result of an explosion. Fifty miners who entered the shaft several hours after the accident, in an attempt to effect rescue, were driven out by the gas. Some of them, becoming unconscious, were carried to the surface by comrades. All the missing miners are foreigners.

Reading.—Despondent because she would have to undergo an operation in the near future, Mrs. Ell Z. Welch ended her life in a horrible manner. She had been melancholy for a week or more and two women attendants were in constant attention. While they went out of the room for a short time, Mrs. Welch made her way to the bath room and securing a match struck it and set her dress on fire. In a moment she was enveloped in flames. She fell down a flight of stairs, her burning gown setting fire to the carpet and other wearing apparel. Her husband's both hands were terribly burned in fighting the flames. She died an hour later in a local hospital.

Reading.—The death of Charles Segner, of Ploverville, several days ago is attributed to the hold-ups that have been taking place in this vicinity lately. Mr. Segner was found on the Green Tree hill in an unconscious condition, with bruises about head and body. He delivered a load of charcoal to Hohnton and was on his way home. He stopped at the Green Tree Hotel to have his team of mules fed after which he mounted the saddle mule and started for Ploverville. It is now supposed that while he was driving over this lonely stretch of woodland some of the persons who have been operating the hold-up game lately suspected Mr. Segner of having the money for the charcoal that was sold and took advantage of this lonely place on the road to hold him up and rob him. Mr. Segner's head and body bear bruises that indicate the use of a heavy club or possibly a revolver butt.

Allentown.—Convicted of manslaughter in court, Ralph Polladino, who two months ago stabbed his former friend, Frank Passerelli, to death in a fight that followed a party, was sentenced to six years in prison by Judge Trexler.

Pittsburgh.—The Governor and his staff, many members of the Pennsylvania Legislature and scores of friends of the deceased, attended the funeral of John Fremont Cox, late Speaker of the House of Representatives in First Methodist Episcopal Church in Homestead.

CHANGES IN FOOTBALL

New System of Coaching Gives Many Players Chance.
Old Machine Gives Place to Squad Capable of Experimental Shifts in Course of Game—Eleven Is Made More Plastic.

Football coaching has undergone a radical change in the last few years as has the game itself, and nothing exemplifies this so much as the methods in vogue in the middle west. There is less change in the east, for eastern elevens are so hedged about with their traditions and "coaching systems" that reform is hard to accomplish with the big teams of the district, and as the smaller schools, as a general rule, follow the example of the larger the change is less apparent than in the district known to western followers of the game as the conference district.

The conference district does not mean the conference itself, but the territory influenced by that body, which may be summed up as the states of Illinois, Indiana, Wisconsin, Michigan, Minnesota, Iowa, Missouri and Nebraska. Schools of the Missouri valley conference follow the example set by the older and more powerful "big eight," while most of the minor schools in that territory follow the larger.

In no school is the change in coaching more apparent than in an institution no longer membered among the conference. The change in Michigan's coaching has been thorough and the work of Yost there in the last few years has been about as different from that used previous to 1905 as night is from day.

That the change is for the better is shown by the increase in strength of the Wolverine teams toward the close of the season and the bringing out of stars. Even in the palmy days of Michigan's "steam roller" Yost never was able to get more than one man on an All-American football eleven in any one year. Last season Yost had two men, Benbrook and Wells, neither of whom would have had much better than an outside chance of making the all star team under the old system of coaching.

In the years when beef and brawn constituted the greatest qualifications for a player the Michigan eleven often was formed after the first or second game of the season and there was little chance for a man who had not secured a place up to that time, to get into any of the later games unless one of the "regulars" was benched by injury. Everything was concentrated upon eleven men and the whole work was bringing these men to working as a unit. Little account was taken of substitutes and as a consequence, the team obliged to put in fresh men at any stage of the game labored under a disadvantage rather than an advantage.

From the start of the season the cry was "score, score" and Yost earned the appellation of "Hurry Up" in those days by his ability to keep his men running up and down the field against opponents, often piling up scores of a hundred or more points against his early season opponents. Indeed, the cry for big scores was such that a Michigan team which failed to score more than fifty points against its early season opponents was counted a failure. This was not confined to Michigan by any means for all schools in the conference at that time were score mad, but Yost seemed to possess the faculty of getting higher scores against his opponents than did any of his rival mentors in the big nine.
