SECRETARY KNOX TO GO JUNKETING

To Visit Cuba and the Central American Republics.

TRIP MAY INCLUDE MEXICO

Hopes To Solve Problems and Acquire More Accurate Information About Latin-American Neighbors.

Washington.—For the purpose of solving diplomatic problems and acquiring more accurate information as to conditions in Central and Northern South America, Secretary of State Knox, by direction of President Taft, will make a five weeks' trip to the Spanish-American republics bordering the Caribbean Sea and the Gulf of Mexico.

Present plans include first a visit to Cuba, Santo Domingo and Haiti, with a possible side trip to Porto Rico, and then a tour of Venezuela and Colombia on the mainland of South America, after which the Secretary will visit Panama, Costa Rica, Nicaragua, Honduras, Salvador, Guatemala and perhaps Mexico.

As now planned Mr. Knox will not visit Mexico, but that country may be included in the program before he returns during the first week of April.

In many respects the trip will be similar to that taken around South America several years ago by former Secretary of State Elihu Root.

The benefits of the Root trip American diplomats have rated high, and both the President and Mr. Knox hope for similar benefits from the coming visit, especially since the countries to which Mr. Knox will go never have received calls from American Secretaries of State.

The official announcement of the trip says:

"The relations of the United States to the Spanish republics surrounding the Caribbean Sea and the Gulf of Mexico are of the utmost importance to us in view of our interests and responsibilities in that region. The President thinks it will be of great assistance in solving the diplomatic problems that are presenting themselves, from day to day, if we manifest our friendly interest in those, our neighboring republics, by a visit to them of the Secretary of State.

"For that reason, the President has directed the Secretary of Navy to put at the disposal of the Secretary of State the cruiser Washington for the purpose of making the trip. Secretary Knox will leave from some point in Florida within the next two weeks and may be gone until the first week in April."

LEAVES THE FIELD TO CLARK.

Ex-Gov. Folk Out of the Presidential Race.

St. Louis.—Former Governor Joseph W. Folk withdrew as an active candidate for the Democratic nomination for President, after he had received a telegram from Champ Clark, which agreed to divide the Missouri delegation to the Democratic National Convention, as recently suggested by William J. Bryan. Mr. Folk not only agreed to divide the delegation but asked his friends to make no further effort in his behalf. He promised to support Mr. Clark.

HUMAN BONES 50,000 YEARS OLD.

Belong To Race Type Like Present Peruvian Indians.

New Haven, Conn.—Professor Bowman, of the Yale geological department, after a more careful study of the human bones found by the Bingham expedition to Peru, estimates their minimum age at 50,000 years, instead of 10,000 years, the original estimate. The bones were located under about 100 feet of alluvial soil of the glacial age. Dr. Eaton, of the Yale museum, has determined beyond doubt that the bones belong to a race type like that of the present Indians of Peru.

TROOPS TO EL PASO.

Battalion Of Infantry Ordered There From Arizona.

Washington.—A battalion of the Eighteenth Infantry has been ordered from Whipple Barracks, Ariz., to El Paso, Tex. The situation at Juarez, opposite El Paso, is supposed to be ugly, the insurgents being much disturbed over the threatened entry of Madero troops into that place by way of American territory. The State Department has concluded to decline the request of the Madero government for permission for Mexican troops to cross Texas.

WANT BRYAN AT CONVENTION.

Nebraska Friends Would Elect Him Delegate-At-Large.

Lincoln, Neb.—A petition signed by 5,000 Democratic voters was filed by friends of William J. Bryan here, requesting that his name be placed on the ballot as a candidate for delegate-at-large to the Democratic National Convention. The petition of Dr. P. L. Hall, vice-president of the Democratic National Committee, for re-election as national committeeman, also was filed.

COMMERCIAL

Weekly Review of Trade and Market Reports.

R. G. Dun & Co.'s weekly review of trade says:

"Money market conditions give the key to the whole business situation. The great accumulation of surplus funds in New York has made it about the cheapest money market in the world and has enabled it to loan at about \$150,000,000 abroad, making this country, for the time being, a powerful creditor nation. This is a condition of immense strength.

"The iron and steel trade, while still operating somewhat below full capacity, fairly maintains its recent gains. The Philadelphia hoistery and underwear dealers report an improved demand, and Baltimore clothing trade experiences a pronounced gain in orders from the South."

Bradstreet's says:

"Trade and industry are not moving in consonance with highly keyed anticipations, but in general business tends to expand, following a relatively quiet period in January. Visiting buyers are not making heavy purchases, being content to buy frequently and in small lots to only cover actual requirements and not to anticipate them in a speculative sense."
