The plans of operation for joint cultivation of shad for the Delaware in conjunction with New Jersey and of pike perch in Lake Erie with the Ohio State fish authorities are now being worked out by Nathan R. Buller, the State Commissioner of Fisheries, and everymonthly period as soon as they are under way steps to arrange for the improvement of conditions at the McCall's Ferry dam on the lower Susquehanna will be undertaken. All of the fish wardens in the State have been summoned to meet the Commissioner at Williamsport on March 14 to arrange for the spring work and a plan whereby the State police will co-operate during the trout season will be worked out. The Mc-Call's Ferry situation, which has been the cause of more trouble than anything else in the Fisheries Department in the last two years, will be taken up by the State Fish Commission on March 19. York legislators and citizens have been here on numerous occasions to protest against the construction of the dam and to demand some means whereby shad could get up the river. The Commissioner has given assurance that the matter will be taken up and on March 20 Mr. Buller and the members of the commission will go to the big dam to determine what must be done this year to restore the fishing on the Susquehanna

Must Have Licenses.

Perhaps in no season in recent years were as many crack youngsters discovered or developed as during the campaign of 1911. The new stars discovered in the pitcher's box were Rube Marquard of the Giants, Grover Cleveland Alexander and George Chalmers of the Phillies, Vean Gregg of the Cleveland Naps, Roy Caldwell of the Highlanders, Marty O'Toole of the Pirates, and Buck O'Brien of the Boston Red Sox. Other promising young boxmen of 1911 who may get into the star class in another season or two were Bill Steele of the Cardinals, Dave Danforth of the Athletics, Gene Krapp of the Cleveland Naps, Bobbie Keefe and Rube Benton of the Cincinnati Reds and George Tyler of the Boston Nationals.
