RIOTOUS SCENE IN THE CAPITOL

General Mix-up at Congressional Strike Hearing.

MEN FROM LAWRENCE THERE

Representative Berger Started the Trouble—He and a Member Of Lawrence Delegation Exchange Ugly Epithets.

Washington.—At the conclusion for the day of an unusual hearing before the House Committee on Rules on bills proposing an investigation of conditions relating to the strike of textile workers at Lawrence, Mass., Representative Victor Berger, of Wisconsin, and Robert McCartney, of the citizens' committee of Lawrence, almost came to blows and were separated by Representative Wilson, of Pennsylvania.

The Rules Committee had adjourned the hearing, to be resumed on Monday, necessitating the stay in Washington of women and children from the Lawrence woolen mills who had been sent here to give testimony concerning strike conditions.

"Who is going to pay the expenses of these people?" asked Representative Berger, the Socialist member of the House, as the committee was about to adjourn.

Representative Henry, chairman of the committee, declared nothing could be done by the committee in advance of an investigation on such a matter, whereupon Representative Wilson, of Pennsylvania, suggested that a collection be taken to defray the expenses.

Samuel Gompers, president of the American Federation of Labor, was the first to contribute and Representative Berger held the hat. Several Lawrence young women collected the contributions, which came from men and women in the committee room.

When Lewis S. Cox, the postmaster of Lawrence, contributed \$1 Representative Berger protested.

"Give him back his money," said Berger to Miss Josephine Liss, who had collected it. "We don't want any blood money."

McCartney, who was standing nearby, immediately protested against Berger's insinuation and for several minutes the committee room was in confusion.

"Who are you?" demanded McCartney of Berger.

"I represent the people of Wisconsin," Berger hotly replied, "and I don't propose to have these people receive any blood money."

"I probably have as much money as you have," McCartney replied, "and it isn't blood money."

The Massachusetts man was shaking his fist in Representative Berger's face, and the Socialist Congressman was emphatic in his language demanding that Miss Liss give back the dollar.

As she gave back the money Representative Wilson, of Illinois, a member of the Rules Committee, intervened between Berger and McCartney, who were almost on the verge of combat. His interference in the squabble ended the controversy, and McCartney and Cox left the room.

This was the climax to an exciting session of the committee in which the Lawrence strike conditions were revealed from several rival sources.

PRESIDENT GIVES WARNING.

Americans Are Advised To Keep Out Of Mexico.

Washington.—The gravity of the situation in Mexico caused President Taft to issue a proclamation virtually warning American citizens to refrain from entering that country and those now residing there to leave when conditions threaten to become intolerable.

The decision to issue such a warning was reached at a special meeting of the Cabinet. The proclamation was augmented by a telegram addressed by the State Department to Ambassador Wilson, in the City of Mexico. The Ambassador was instructed to inform Americans in peril there to withdraw across the border, leaving their effects in the care of the nearest United States consul. Copies of the telegram were sent also to all consular agents.

The President's utterance, it was explained, was in no sense a recognition of the revolutionary movement in the sister republic to the south. Neither was it to be looked upon as a declaration of neutrality. It was declared the utterance was solely a warning to Americans to avoid any thing that might savor of partisanship in the existing state of affairs.

MAKES SON TAKE HIS MEDICINE.

Chillicothe, Mo.—Denied help by his father, a circuit judge in South Carolina, who wrote that it would be best for him to take his medicine like a man, W. L. Mimms, a youth arrested for passing a number of forged checks threw himself upon the mercy of the court after he had pleaded guilty. Sentence has been reserved. Mimms is said to have realized about \$2,000.

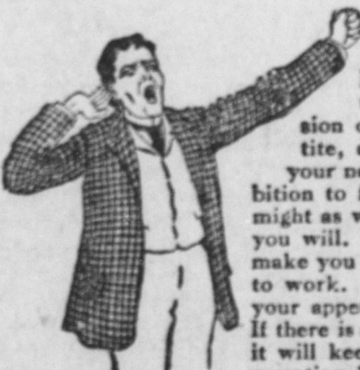
