Weekly Review of Trade and Market Reports.

R. G. Dun & Co.'s weekly Review of Trade says:

"An increased movement of trade reflects the near approach of spring, and what is of greater significance, the admirable conditions prevailing in the winter wheat sections produce a more buoyant feeling in Western trade circles and the whole business situation is benefited thereby. This is all the better because of unsettling influences prevailing in many parts of the world."

Bradstreet's reports:

"Wheat, including flour, exports from the United States and Canada for the week aggregate 1,899,227 bushels, against 3,268,770 last week and 2,248,873 this week last year. Corn exports for the week are 2,247,363 bushels, against 1,961,495 last week and 2,364,605 in 1911."
