NATION BURIES NAVAL HEROES

Last Chapter in Historic Tragedy of the Maine.

SERVICES MOST IMPRESSIVE

President Taft Delivers a Glowing Eulogy and Chaplain Childwick Makes a Beautiful Address—The Last Salute.

Washington.—The American nation Saturday wrote the final chapter of the tragedy of the Maine and paid its full measure of tribute to the heroes who were sacrificed on the altar of patriotism 14 years ago.

With a wealth of sentiment the bones of 67 unidentified dead resurrected from the harbor of Havana were consigned by a reverent republic to the sacred soil of Arlington National Cemetery, to be mingled with the dust of the country's hallowed dead.

President Taft and his Cabinet, both houses of Congress and all the other officials of the Government set aside the day and did homage to the remains.

Services Held in City.

Before the observances at the graves a solemn service was held on the south front of the State, War and Navy Building. This was attended by the President and Vice-President, Chief Justice White and his associates on the bench of the Supreme Court, members of both houses of Congress, all officers of both branches of the military service and members of the diplomatic corps.

Father Childwick Eloquent.

Chaplain Bayard, of the navy, offered prayer and then Chaplain Childwick spoke from a full heart. Before him stretched a half mile of cortege that contained all that was mortal of the men to whom he had administered spiritually more than 14 years ago. His eyes were wet when he began.

"For the aid of a new people and the advancement and glory of our own country," he said, "these heroes gave up their lives, this sacrifice that we see before us was made. Today we thank God we sent forth our soldiers, not with vengeance in their hearts but with the feeling of humanity and justice, to right the wrong."

"We have placed no responsibility for the tragedy, and thank God for that. We wish everything good for the nation with which we are now at peace and whose prosperity we desire. Nevertheless, the ship was an altar and the men who perished a sacrifice."

President Delivers Eulogy.

A sharp patter of hail began to fall when President Taft, bareheaded, walked to the front of the platform.

"We meet to pay appropriate honor to the memory of the first of the country's sons who gave up their lives in our war with Spain. I do not mean by this to charge responsibility to the Spanish Government for the explosion of the Maine, but that the tragedy was part of the causes which led up to the Spanish War so one familiar with the circumstances can now doubt. That war every American can feel proud of because it was fought without a single selfish instinct and was prompted by the most altruistic motives. Beginning with a self-denying ordinance with respect to Cuba, we were forced into the attitude of taking over the Philippines and our course in those islands has reflected the highest credit on our purposes and civilization.

"These, our honored dead, were hurled into eternity without the inspiration or anticipated battle or hope for victory. But they were on duty when they went down; they wore the uniforms of their beloved country; and they are to be classed well to the fore in that long list of naval heroes whose steadfastness and courage have given the American Navy the high position it occupies in history among the navies of the world.

"We have given to these ceremonies all possible solemnity that are included in the honors of war, and we shall fail if they do not express in unmistakable tone and sign the deep and lasting gratitude of a nation to her martyred defenders."

PARAGUAYAN REBELS WIN.

600 Men Reported Killed in Recent Battles.

Buenos Ayres, Argentina.—The victory of the revolutionary forces over the Paraguayan Government troops at Asuncion is complete. More than 600 men are reported to have been killed during the battle. President Pedro Pena has taken refuge at the Uruguayan Legation in Asuncion.

SIX DIE FROM GAS.

Eight Other Aged Infirmaries Inmates In Critical Condition.

Norwalk, O.—Six inmates of the men's dormitory at the Huron County Infirmary were found dead and eight are unconscious and in a critical condition from gas asphyxiation. They were found when another inmate sought to enter the room in which the 14 men slept. A broken valve in the engine room just below flooded the sleeping room with gas.
