Allowed to Buy War Material in This Country.

GREAT HELP TO FEDERALS

President Grants Permission To Mexice To Buy and Ship Rifles and Ammunition To Recruit Army From the Rurales.

Washington. - President Francisco in confidence, despite some untoward a vigorous campaign against the rebeis and the American government has general situation. consented to permit the shipment from the United States of arms and ammunition for his soldiers.

It is the intention of President Madero to replenish his diminished army with fresh recruits, throwing them around the strongholds of the rebels. The serious problem of arming them has been simplified by a decision of the United States authorizing by special permission in each case the Mexican government to purchase munitions of war here and ship them across the border. Under this policy three consignments of arms and ammunition already have gone into Mexico.

The joint resolution of Congress, under which President Taft's recent proclamation forbidding the exportation of munitions of war was issued. authorized the President to make exceptions in his discretion.

The attitude of President Taft, as explained by officials here, is to permit the Mexican government to buy whatever it pleases in this country. This is no violation of neutrality, it is added, as the belligerency of the revolutionists has not been recognized. Extreme precautions will be taken to prevent war supplies consigned to the Mexican government from falling into the hands of the rebels, who are denied the privilege of receiving such materials under the President's procla-

The reinforcements contemplated by President Madero must be composed of raw recruits, but it is declared by Mexican officials that the personnel would be very effective from a military point of view, as the army will be composed of rurales already used to some sort of discipline. They are bold and experienced riders and fighters, used to running down brigands in their mountain fastnesses and capable of living upon the coun-

try where they campaign. Meanwhile the American army re mains idle, so far as Mexico is concerned; the Navy pursues the peaceful routine of still further pulverizing the remnant of the wreck of the old battleship San Marcos, and there is no visible sign of any change of mind on the part of the administration in

its policy of absolute non-intervention. Attorney General Wickersham, interpreting President Taft's proclamation, has decided that dynamite, other explosives and marhinery for making arms and ammunition must be regarded as munitions of war and cannot be exported to Mexico except by special executive permission.


