ARMS ARE BEING SENT TO MADERO

Allowed to Buy War Material in This Country.

GREAT HELP TO FEDERALS

President Grants Permission To Mexico To Buy and Ship Rifles and Ammunition To Recruit Army From the Rurales.

Washington, July 27.—President Francisco Madero, of Mexico, has decided upon a vigorous campaign against the rebels and the American government has consented to permit the shipment from the United States of arms and ammunition for his soldiers.

It is the intention of President Madero to replenish his diminished army with fresh recruits, throwing them around the strongholds of the rebels.

The joint resolution of Congress, under which President Taft's recent proclamation forbidding the exportation of munitions of war was issued, authorized the President to make exceptions in his discretion.

The attitude of President Taft, as explained by officials here, is to permit the Mexican government to buy whatever it pleases in this country. This is no violation of neutrality.

The reinforcements contemplated by President Madero must be composed of raw recruits, but it is declared by Mexican officials that the personnel would be very effective from a military point of view.

Meanwhile the American army remains idle, so far as Mexico is concerned; the Navy pursues the peaceful routine of still further pulverizing the remnant of the wreck of the old battleship San Marcos, and there is no visible sign of any change of mind on the part of the administration in its policy of absolute non-intervention.
