WOMEN BALKED AT LEAP TO LIFEBOAT

Cause of Many Being Left Explained at Hearing.

INDIVIDUAL EXAMINATIONS

Boats Hung Out Three Feet From Ship's Side—Ship's Crew Say. Builder Abcard Passed Word She Was Sinking.

Washington.—Why many women were left to drown on the Titanic was explained to Senator Smith in his private office by F. O. Evans, a Titanic sailor.

Senator Smith announced that 14 members of the crew were examined at night by individual members of the investigating committee. About 12 more men remain to be disposed of in the same manner, and most of the crew probably will be released without testifying in open session. The evidence taken at night will be entered in the regular testimony.

The committee members seem to be well pleased with the examination of witnesses by individual members of the committee, and this procedure will be followed with all of the members of the crew here, and may be adopted with the passengers. The individual examinations are a great improvement on the plan first adopted, and, according to indications now, the investigation will be concluded some time this week. If the old manner of questioning all witnesses in open session had been followed the investigation would have taken several weeks.

ASTOR AND STRAUS BODIES.
Found By the Mackay-Bennett Cable Ship.

New York.—The bodies of John Jacob Astor and Isidor Straus, who were lost in the Titanic disaster, have been recovered and embalmed and are now on board the funeral ship Mackay-Bennett. This information was contained in a wireless dispatch from the Mackay-Bennett to the White Star Line offices in this city. In the dispatch was given a list of 34 names of additional bodies recovered, and a list of 15 which have been embalmed.

\$1,500,000 TO REPAIR LEVEES.

Senate Willing to Spend Money To Hold Mississippi in Check.

Washington.—The Senate adopted a joint resolution authorizing the immediate use of \$1,500,000 of the proposed Mississippi river appropriation to be used in the repair of the lower levees. The resolution was introduced by Senator Percy, who said the floods had rendered homeless more than 100,000 persons, while 6,000,000 acres would be unfit for crop growing this year. The measure now goes to the House.

FIGHT ON STEEL TRUST.

Taking Of Evidence Before Special Examiner.

Philadelphia.—The taking of evidence before Examiner Henry P. Brown in the government's suit for the dissolution of the United States Steel Corporation will begin in New York on May 6. Announcement to this effect was made here. Counsel for both the steel corporation and its subsidiaries and the government were notified to be ready.

FOUR CHILDREN PERISH.

Fatal Fire Caused By Explosion Of Gasoline Stove.

Rochester, Mich.—Four children of Mrs. Charles Slack are dead; the mother is seriously burned, and Fire Chief Porter is painfully injured as the result of the explosion of a gasoline stove which set fire to and destroyed the Slack home here.

Shoots Husband and Self.

Bedford, Ind.—Mrs. William Ping shot and fatally wounded her husband while seated at the dinner table, and then shot herself. Both will die. It is said the couple had trouble for some time over Mr. Ping's children by a former marriage.

Unculled Oysters Aboard.

Annapolis.—Justice Davis imposed a fine and costs on Allen Shelton, master of the vessel Lottie M. Lerch, of Dorchester county, for having unculled oysters in his possession.

\$750,000 For Titanic Fund.

London.—Lord Mayor Crosby's relief fund for the Titanic survivors and families of the sailors who perished was \$750,000 at noon Friday.

Tornado Kills Four.

Wichita, Kan.—The tornado that swept along the Kansas-Oklahoma line left four dead and many injured. Seventy-five houses in one district were demolished. In one section of the state houses were blown over, railroads and telegraph wires put out of commission and general havoc caused. At Ponca City the wind mowed a path 200 yards wide through the outer edge of the residence section.

Weekly Review of Trade and Market Reports.

Bradstreet's says: "Trade is steady as a whole, and in many lines the volume of business is in excess of that done at this time last year. Still, more or less irregularity has developed, and there has been some recession from the activity witnessed in recently preceding weeks. This trend is due in part to the fact that near future spring requirements have been covered. However, the undertone of affairs is strong."

R. G. Dun & Co.'s weekly review of trade says: "Reports from the leading trade centers indicate that the recent progress toward increased business confidence and activity continues and no current development, however disturbing, seems to check the movement. The growth of a more optimistic business sentiment is especially conspicuous in the West and Southwest. The fearful disaster to the steamship Titanic has had a more or less depressing effect upon the market and is a matter of special concern in shipping and insurance circles."

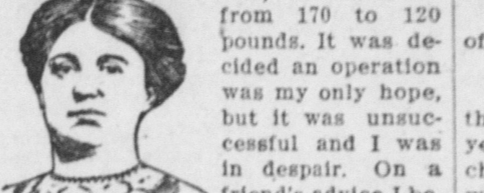
