He stuck to his evidence, and, although he could not specify when he first made the statement discrediting the Duff-Gordons, Sir Rufus Isaacs, the attorney general, was able to prompt him from depositions taken at the time of the arrival of the crew in England, in which the witness had said "passengers protested" against the boat going back.
