A son was born to Mr. and Mrs. William F. Colyer, on the Colyer farm, east of Old Fort. This is son No. 2 and this will more than please the young father.
J. W. Mowery is back to his old home near Centre Hall. For some months he had charge of the Lyric, in Bellefonte, but since its sale to Harry Harper his services are no longer needed, as Mr. Harper is operating the picture show himself.
Memorial services will be held in Centre Hall as usual, at six o'clock. The children will meet at the Evangelical church and march from there to the cemetery. Prayer will be offered by Rev. S. A. Snyder and the address will be by Rev. R. Raymond Jones.
Unless something unforeseen happens, Rev. F. W. Barry will fill his appointments on the Lutheran charge on Sunday as is indicated on the regular schedule. He expects to come to Centre Hall on Saturday. His father, he reports, is somewhat improved, since having returned from a Philadelphia hospital.
A short time ago several girls and children were wandering about the Snyder improvements, along the Seven Mountains, above Reiber's farm near Colyer, and looking down a well or cistern discovered a dead deer lying in it. It is presumed the animal fell into the pit as it bounded along the mountain side to escape something that frightened it.

It is presumed the animals ate some poisonous weed while pasturing in a clearing.
The passenger train west on Tuesday morning killed a cow belonging to Daniel Houser, west of Centre Hall. Mr. Houser was herding his cattle on the cross road leading from his place to a neighbor who was working in a field nearby. During his absence the cattle wandered onto the right-of-way, and when the train came along one of the cows failed to clear the track soon enough to avoid being hit.

Meyers, for four years superintendent of the Philipsburg schools, has announced that he is not a candidate for reelection, and that it is his intention to go to Philadelphia to engage in business. Mr. Meyers is a thorough school man, and was also greatly admired by the rank and file of the public school teachers throughout the county for his ability shown as a musical director at the county institutes.
