

DEATHS

Mrs. Catharine Gramley died at her home in Rebersburg after an illness extending over a period of some months.

Interment was made on Saturday morning at Rebersburg, Rev. Charles Hassinger, pastor of the local Lutheran church having been the officiating minister, and pastor of the deceased.

Her second husband was Samuel Gramley, also deceased. The step children are: Prof. C. L. Gramley, Clement Gramley, Mrs. W. C. Hubler, Rebersburg; T. M. Gramley, Spring Mills; Mrs. Charles Heckman, Nitanny. Three brothers also survive.

Mrs. David Oty died at her home at Manor, Sunday morning, after a long illness. Her maiden name was Ellen Pennington, the oldest daughter of John and Sarah (Slack) Pennington, both deceased.

She was born near Potters Mills, in 1853, and lived there until her marriage to Mr. Oty in 1881. Her husband, three sons and two daughters, five grandchildren, six sisters and four brothers survive.

Rural Carriers Get Increase. Beginning July 1st all rural mail carriers' salaries were boosted considerably. The schedule follows: The compensation of rural carriers for carrying the mail six days each week, on standard routes of 24 miles in length shall be the sum of \$1.010 per annum, to be paid monthly; and on routes exceeding the 24 miles in length the sum of \$4.75 per mile per annum for each mile in excess of 24 miles; and on routes under 24 miles in length a corresponding reduction of compensation per mile per annum shall be paid.

Barclay, of Sinnemahoning, submitted to a surgical operation of a quite serious character last week, and his friends will be much interested in learning that he has since been getting along favorably, so far. Captain Barclay received the surgical attention at the Garfield hospital, Washington, D. C.
