AUTOMOBILE HAS A WING

French Motor Car Is Driven in the Same Manner as an Aeroplane.

A successful trial run was made recently from Paris to London, about \$20 miles, by a motor car driven by a revolving wing, the Paris Figaro states.

The vehicle, which was designed by M. Bertrand de Lesseps, and is called the "winged car," has the appearance of an ordinary motor car, save that in front it is shaped like the prow of a ship. From the extremeity of the prow extends a shaft to which is attached the propeller-or revolving wing-invented by M. Filippi.

The wing is small, strong and thick and revolves within a protecting cage. The engine is of 40 horse power and rotates the wing by shaft and chain transmission.

There is no other mechanism, the wheels of the car being free, except for footbrakes. By the side of the driver is a vsingle lever which controls the clutch and the forward and reverse movement of the wing. The wing can be reversed at a moment's notice, thereby forming an additional brake. THE NOTIFICATION AT UTICA.

Utica, N. Y.-Vice-President James S. Sherman, the first man to be twice nominated by the Republican party for the office he now fills, was formally notified at his home here Wednesday that he was again the choice of a Republican National Convention.

'This distinction was not sought by me," said the Vice-President, after United States Senator George Sutherland, of Utah, had delivered the speech of notification, "but unsolicited, it is the more appreciated. I cannot but recognize your message as a mandate I must obey."

"The industrial and trade situation fully maintains its recent improvement and a further advance in activity is noted in the reports from the leading centres.

"Everything points to a continuance of the present activity in iron and steel, and the advancing trend of quetations promises increased profits to the producer. Consumers of pig fron are devoting a good deal more attention to their requirements for the first half of next year, but future business is not readily accepted unless higher prices are offered.

"Although the demand for footwear shows further improvement, the enhanced prices asked by manufacturers still cause much conservatism on the part of buyers. All kinds of leather continue in good demand, without any very large transactions, tanners still refusing to contract ahead in any considerable quantity at present quotations."
