

Mr. Williams sustained a loss of about \$800; the property was partially insured.

> There have been a number of fire losses in Centre county due to lightning. Nearly all the losses suffered by the Centre Hall fire insurance company, since early last spring, were caused by lightning. The heavy losses sustained by the Grange fire insurance company, for four or five years prior to eighteen montus ago, were also largely caused by lightning. If this one source of fire could be eliminated, the fire losses in rural districts would be greatly reduced.
