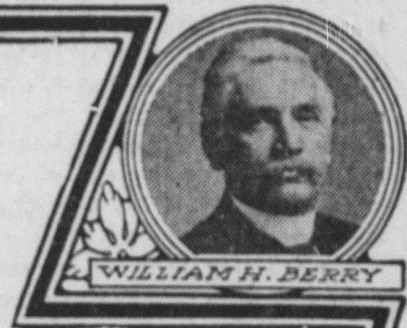
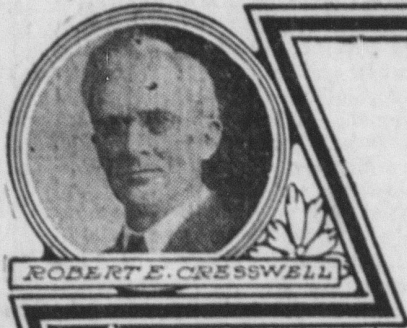

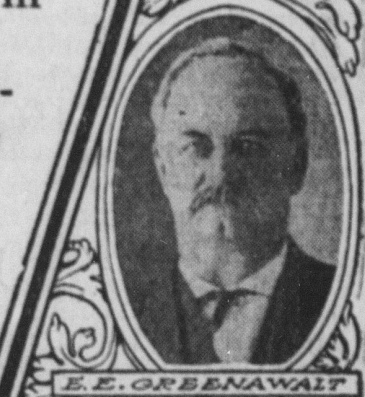
## What Democracy Stands For IN THE STATE OF PENNSYLVANIA

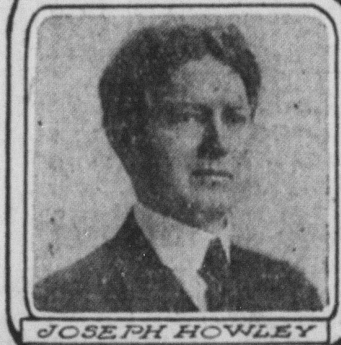
