The farmer has to have several scores of articles, machinery of different kinds and agricultural and garden implements, to make his business a success. The protectionist graft compels him to pay several hundred dollars extra in excess prices to get started in successful farming on even a small scale.

Enough to Buy Ten Acres

The average value per acre of all farms in the United States in 1910 was only \$31.26. The farmer can calculate that he would rather have an extra ten acres of land than make a forced contribution of even \$300 in excessive prices to protect manufacturers.

The wonderful and new interest the Republican party is taking in helping the farmer to secure credit is based upon the sound self-interest of protected manufacturers. They know that if the farmer is to pay high protection prices, which run from a quarter to a third higher than the export prices for the same articles, he must have easier credit. The Republican party seriously suggests, therefore, that farmers should keep in debt so as to be able to pay protection's extortion prices.

But farmers don't always see themselves as others, especially Republicans, see them. Will they see themselves kept heavily in debt for the sake of paying \$500 or even \$300 excess profits to manu-

"PROTECTED" FARMER'S WIFE.**

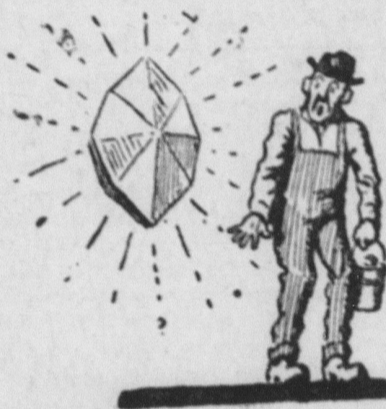

facturers of agricultural machinery and implements, even if the rate of interest be 4½ per cent. instead of 6 per cent.? Wouldn't they rather buy their implements at the same prices as their foreign competitors and save the principal of \$500 or even \$300, as well as the interest they now pay to protected manufacturers?

Agricultural implements to the value of nearly \$60,000,000 were exported in 1911 to North America alone, a large part of these at prices from a quarter to a third cheaper than the price charged the American farmer.

The farmer can see, in spite of the black eye that protection has given him, that he doesn't gain anything by the protective system which makes him pay much more than his competitors all over the world for the implements and machinery he must use to earn his living, while he does not reap any appreciable benefits from the system, which claims to "protect" him.
