CROPS AND LIVESTOCK—\$9,532,000.000 (Continued from last page)

The farm value of the crops, on December 1, was estimated as follows: Corn, 48 7 cents a bushel; winter wheat, 80 9 cents; spring wheat, 70 1 cents; all wheat, 76 cents; oats, 31 9 cents; barley, 50 5 cents; rye, 66 8 cents; buckwheat, 66 1 cents; flaxseed, \$1 15; rice, 93 5 cents; potatoes, 50 5 cents; hay, \$11.79 a ton; tobacco, 10 8 cents a pound.

Corn, the greatest crop of all, went almost 200,000,000 bushels beyond the record crop grown in 1906, and surpassed the 1911 crop by 593,258,000 bushels.

The total wheat crop was 108,929,000 bushels greater than last year; oats, 469,039,000 bushels greater; barley, 63,584,000 bushels greater; rye, 2,545,000 bushels greater; buckwheat, 1,700,000 bushels greater; flaxseed, 8,703,000 bushels greater; potatoes, 127,910,000 bushels greater; hay, 1,775,000 tons greater; tobacco, 57,716,000 pounds greater, and rice 2,120,000 bushels greater.

Mrs. Sarah Stover, wife of John F. Stover, died at her home near Peru, on Saturday. She was aged sixty-eight years, eleven months, and twenty days.

Mrs. Stover was ill for a period of five weeks, having been a sufferer from apoplexy. Interment was made in the Shiloh Lutheran cemetery, and the services were conducted by Rev. C. S. Stover, of Boalsburg.

Oscar H. Osman, of Columbus, Ohio, died suddenly at his home of heart failure.

Mr. Osman was a native of Lemont and for some time a prominent business man of Snow Shoe. He went to Columbus, Ohio, two years ago where he has been engaged in the undertaking business.

He is survived by his wife and one son.

John Selke died at Scotia Monday morning and was buried at Pine Hall Wednesday afternoon. He was the father of Mrs. John Budis, who was murdered several years ago by the negro, Bert Delige.

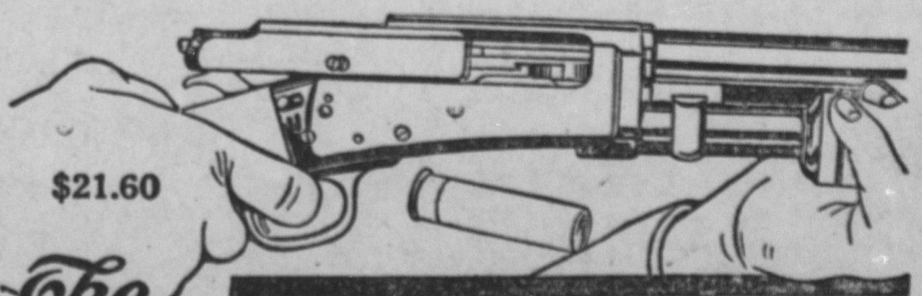
